I hope some of you were able to connect and join in the process. The ladies from PEI, N.S., N.B. and PEI who were at my table engaged in a lively discussion as I input their responses to the questions on my iPad. There were 4 resolutions brought forward with 2 being from Ontario and 2 from B.C. All of them passed after much discussion and a report on them, prepared by Mary Bannon, is in this Lingo. members from across the country. Next year the national convention will be in Winnipeg.



Dear Sisters in the League,

I have just taken off my boots as it has been a remarkable experience of my first flooded rectory in 27 years as a priest. Though there is no comparison whatsoever with the devastation which Hurricane Harvey has caused, Windsor got hit with a rain storm this past week like never before. My rectory was one of the 3,800 homes that became "officially flooded". So, I have taken off my boots to dry and sit here reflecting on my article for the wonderful women of the Catholic Woman's League

A slogan at one of our funeral homes here in Windsor reads: "With you every step of the way". I have felt this slogan come alive with the Catholic Women's League in many ways. How each woman holds each other up as we share the same Mission of the CWL. This slogan became so real for me when I attended the Provincial Convention in Thunder Bay! What an experience (not so much the driving) but being present for my

2nd Provincial Convention and witnessing the One Heart and One Voice of Jesus Christ.

At the beginning of the Conference, Bishop Fred told each of us to be open and accepting of "surprises" referring to how God surprises each of us when we least expect it. Bishop Fred was right on! The surprises that I received personally from God cannot all be written in this report! For the sake of mentioning any, trust me, God is Beautiful and full of Surprises!

As I gazed around the Conference Room I was simply inspired by everything I heard and saw. Please allow me to share a few notes that I wrote down as I was surrounded by these qualities of so many beautiful women. Women are honest, loyal and forgiving. They are smart, knowing that knowledge is power. But they still know how to use their softer side to make a point. Women want to do the best for their family, their friends, and themselves. On Saturday, September 2, 2017 at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs in Delhi, we surprised and paid tribute to Shirley George with the presentation of the Bene Merenti Medal. This award is a papal award presented to those who have lived a life of faith, hope and love displayed in the community and the Church through action and service in the community

Shirley George:

- Founded O.S.A.I.D. (Ontario Students Against Impaired Driving) and O.C.A.I.D. (Ontario Citizens Against Impaired Driving) chapters in Delhi, ON
- Founded Norfolk County Crisis Line and Crime Stoppers
- Taught crafts classes at night school programmes
- Served on the hospital auxiliary at Norfolk General Hospital in Simcoe

- Served as enumerator, Deputy Returning Officer and Deputy Poll Clerk in elections
- Canvassed for United Way after assurances that funds would not be used for abortions
- After receiving her sociology degree she did market research
- Awarded Citizen of the Year in Delhi in 1986

In the Church, this model of faith:

- Joined the CWL in Antigonish in 1961
- President of CWL in Delhi in 1974-76
- President of London Diocesan CWL in 1994-1996
- Was awarded Life Membership in the CWL in 1998
- President of CWL in Ontario 2006-2007

- Involved with the CWL in supporting the Grandmothers


- in Argentina in their protests concerning their lost children and grandchildren

Summer is finally here, by the time you will read this it will be fall with all the beautiful colours that are so amazing. Being here at our family cottage many wonderful adventures are here. Family gatherings, boating swimming. Enjoying our grandchildren with dogs and other pets. How wonderful life can be. We must never forget that our God is with us, and we have to be thankful every moment of our lives.

On Saturdays or Sunday's at our island cottage I go by boat to Parry Sound to church. On one such



occasion the priest asked all C W L Ladies to r a i s e t h e i r hand – including

visitors. I did so. He called me to the front and asked if I would carry the CWL banner for the procession for a few blocks. Myself and another lady agreed. It started raining, but we carried the banner proudly around, and back into the church. It was a great experience. During the procession, the priest carried the beautiful monstrance with the consecrated Host for veneration. The Knights of Columbus carried the statue of St. Peter the Apostle and we all recited the rosary while we were walking. It was beautiful.

Dignity & Rights of Persons: is a huge concern, especially for the elderly in our society. Recently I gave a small workshop about elder abuse, how to recognize and how to prevent it from happening. The feedback I received back, was mostly denial. This can't happen in our society. But unfortunately, it does. Be a friend, be reassuring and supportive volunteering in nursing homes, stay in touch. Abused victims often resist our efforts to help because they feel guilty and ashamed because many times it involves family members. Read about it. Have group discussions. The older person must always be included when decisions concerning his or her welfare are being discussed. Excluding an older person from making his or her own decisions - is considered a form of abuse.

Public Health Department, Community Information Centres. There are many types of home support and community health care services, such as home care and visiting nurses, that can help older adults. This allows them to stay longer in their homes. Often family put them in nursing homes for their own good..... Rarely do they really want to be there. Listen to them. Consider their wishes. Too often however, restraints are being used to prevent older people from falling out of the bed or chair. Friendly visits and open discussions will let us know how they really feel about this.

Stay in touch. In my next directive, I will give more info on how to get

in touch with – and how to obtain more information. If any council wishes for me to come and show a short film to better understand what is involved let me know, perhaps you can get several councils together. Just let me know, and we can plan a workshop.

Elder abuse is against the law. Financially, bodily, or emotionally ... Recognize it.

When people grow older, they are often seen as a burden, yet we need to remember they are the ones who raised us, fed us, and paid their taxes so we could live in the comfort we are used to. They started businesses, gave jobs to jobseekers. Never should we see them in a negative way - as weak, sick, forgetful, and dependent. For we too will become them and be in their shoes one day

As we approach the season of thanksgiving for a lovely summer, crops harvested and our renewal of membership in the sisterhood of the Catholic Women's League, it is with immense gratitude that I write about successes of resolutions passed at the Provincial and National levels. I am filled with thanksgiving for all those who worked on our London resolution including the hard work done by our author, Mary Ann Lealess, (Mitchell council) and then the Provincial Resolution committee who polished it.

Resolutions passed for Provincial action:

Inclusion of Nurses in Provincial Bill 163 (The Supporting Ontario's First Responders Act)

Resolutions passed for National action:

2017.01 Full Implementation of the Supreme Court decision in R. v. Gladue for Indigenous Offenders (from Ontario Provincial council)

2017.02 Mandatory Age Verification Mechanisms for Adult Pornographic Websites (from B.C. & Yukon Provincial council)

2017.03 Zero-rated Status Under the Goods and Services Tax Provisions of the *Excise Tax Act* for Child Safety Products (from Ontario Provincial council) 2017.04 Protection from Coercion of Conscience for Healthcare Professionals (from B.C. & Yukon Provincial council)

My work with Resolutions made me think of the fact that all our work is to bring about God's kingdom, to share God's light, to reflect God's love through our resolutions. Once again Max Lucado inspired me with his words:

The Provincial & National CWL conventions are over and it is time for us to act on resolutions that were gifted by CWL members across Canada such as yourself. There were four resolutions passed at the National level. The full text for them can be found at www.cwl.ca under Resolutions by Year.

- 2017.01 Full Implementation of the Supreme Court Decision in R v. Gladue for Indigenous Offenders
- 2017.02 Mandatory Age Verification Mechanisms for Adult Pornographic Websites
- 2017.03 Zero-Rated Status Under the Goods and Services Tax Provisions of the Excise

Tax Act for Child Safety Products

 2017.04 Protection from Coercion of Conscience for Healthcare Professionals

Also passed at the Provincial level was the following resolution:

ON.17.03 Inclusion of Registered Nurses in Provincial Bill 163, Supporting Ontario's First Responders Act 2016

The federal government will start sitting September 18th and the provincial government on September 11th. Please contact your members of parliament and let them know your concerns.

Passing a resolution is only the first step. Now that we have identified the problem and researched it we have an action plan to follow through with. Make sure that your representatives know exactly how you feel.

Is there anything bothering you at the municipal level? Perhaps going to a meeting at that level will stir your interest and spur you onto bigger projects.

I received the following email and thought it may be of interest to you. If so I urge you to act by either signing the petition or contacting your member of parliament along with the minister of Health.

Just last week, Health Canada released its latest data on the levels of chemicals in the bodies of Canadians. The results are not encouraging – BPA and parabens are detected in almost all of us. But it doesn't have to be this way. The solution is simple: the federal government must <u>fix our outdated toxics law</u>, the Canadian Environmental Protection Act (CEPA).

The federal Ministers of Health and Environment and Climate Change will be making a decision about whether to strengthen our protections from toxics very soon. This is why we are asking you to sign our <u>petition</u> urging the ministers to not delay action and to commit to reforming CEPA based on the recent recommendations of the parliamentary committee on environment.

If we don't fix CEPA now, it may be another decade before parliament reviews the law again.

Your voice and action will make a difference! The more letters the ministers receive this week, the greater the impact. **Just two** years ago, 20,000 letters were sent to decision makers to ban microbeads, and because of you, microbeads are now history. By fixing CEPA, we can ensure that highly concerning chemicals like BPA and phthalates are taken out of products, that bans are implemented quickly, and that our children and most vulnerable people are protected from toxic chemicals.

Monday, 10th July, 2017

Early in July a number of your sisters in the League were inspired by the Spirit and travelled up to Thunder Bay, Ontario for the provincial Convention.

Day One opened onto a sea of Red and White with the attendees all sporting our national colours in support of Canada's 150th Birthday. We opened the day with a Eucharistic Celebration. After the Rules of order were read and reviewed and all committee appointments were acknowledged, Treasurer Pat Rivest went over the Financial Statements for the previous year and secured the auditors for next year.

- 1. Our first inspirational speaker was His Eminence Gerald Cardinal Lacroix, Archbishop of Quebec, and Primate of Canada. Cardinal Lacroix (who donned a Red Cap) took his speech from Pope Francis's Book - The Joy of Love -Amoris Laetitia. Pope Francis spoke of Love as being a Craft. This craft will succeed with lots of Patience and perseverance. In Chapter 8 of the book there are four steps to take to reflect the Ministry of the Pope's ministry. These steps are: Welcoming and Listening - to start a good pastoral dialogue and remain attentive and respectful
- Accompany walk along side with all persons: couples, families, all groups leaving no

- one out, and take the time to allow healing to take place
- 3. Discerning listen to what God as to say in regards to the circumstance of family, learn to grow and guide the faithful to the light of God
- 4. Integrate find places for growth to happen always being welcoming and showing compassion and understanding. Cardinal Lacroix referred to the church as a Field Hospital where we need to find out our strengths and weaknesses.

His next topic was the Challenges Women Face Today. The world view of women has greatly changed over the past few centuries. We are no longer guests but are active members of Society. Women are free and masters of their lives. It is now the time to accept the call of Evangelization. They must open their eyes in order to evangelize. Women today should embrace the word of God and seek a relationship with Jesus.

The final discussions with the Cardinal had us reviewing Biblical situations to help us to look at people in different ways. The situation with Zacchaeus the Tax collector (Luke 19:1.10) shows us how everyone has dignity no matter how bad a person is and deserves respect. Another situation to consider is Jesus with the Centurion (Matthew 8:5.13) where the Lord deals with someone of another Faith and shows how we are all children of God. Other

persons he noted were the Sinful Woman (Luke7:36-50), Nicodemus, the disciples of Emmaus and stopped there pointing out there are so many we can refer to. Cardinal Lacroix wanted us to see how important it is to gain the trust and confidence of others so they will stay to ask for more.

Tuesday, July 11th, 2017

What a beautiful part of Ontario this is. Had a great road trip seeing places I have never seen before with 5 CWL sisters to get here.

The morning started with mass in the ballroom with Bishop Colli, Provincial Advisor, Archbishop Brendan O'Brien, Kingston Diocese & His Eminence Gérald Lacroix, Archbishop of Quebec, Primate of Canada – (keynote speaker on Monday).

After mass the Resolutions were presented to the delegates:

17.ON.01 Full Implementation of the Supreme Courts Gladue Decision (1999) for Indigenous Women Offenders - CARRIED with amendments

17.ON.02 - Grant GST Zero-rated status to all child safety products listed in the Canada Consumer Product Safety Act (CCPSA) is subject to the Goods & Services Tax (GST) - carried with amendments

17.ON.03 - Inclusion of Registered Nurses in Provincial Bill 163 Supporting Ontario's First Responders Act 2016 - CARR London Diocesan Council Resolution)

Look for all the full resolutions on the Ontario website www.cwl.on.ca

The task now is to watch for the decisions at National Convention being held in Prince Edward Island from August 7th to 9th 2017.

Bishop Colli gave a report on sharing ideas, advice on new spiritual advisors with regards to CWL, meetings etc. & supporting Catholic Missions in Canada. He was presented with a "Spiritual Bouquet" on his retirement as Ontario Provincial Spiritual Advisor.

A Social Justice Award was given to Marth Whelton – Toronto Diocese. She feels sometimes she does not do enough, but this will motivate her to do more.

Catholic Women's League Leadership Foundation - last June 2016 a council was formed to facilitate visits to raise \$1.5 million to stabilize the foundation & move forward. 95% of the goal has been raised (\$1,244,300) - now stands as of today, at convention \$1.35 million. There are 83,000 CWL women in Canada - Ontario has over 50,000. We received a postcard in the Spring national magazine but National has only received this card from 200 members to date. The goal is to meet the 1.5 million or over by the end of August - works out to only \$3.00 per member.

Bishop Colli blessed 3 new Life Members – Jeannie Coleman – Alexandria/Cornwall; Anna Brady – Hamilton; Mary Capobianco – Toronto.

In the morning it was explained by Cindy Crowe, Blue Sky what "Walking in Spirit with our Sisters" was. They work with governments & industry. A circle

is important - shows we are all one tribe - Legend of a Medicine Wheel. One part is each part of a person in one quadrant. The four colours depict the 4 colours of people around the world - White, Black, Yellow & Red. Each group carries a special gift, but until we join these groups together, we will continue the way we are now in Canada. Cindy believes strongly that we need to take our own responsibility for our own actions. Simple as reaching out to your neighbour, holding a door open for someone. We are no longer connected to each other. We are sisters from all races. Each delegate was asked to bring a small bottle of water from the area they lived in in These waters were Ontario. gathered and poured into 2 large containers and were taken by some delegates who poured the water into Lake Superior with our prayers for the missing & murdered Indigenous Women.

In the afternoon, we took part in a Ceremonial Walk & Circle outside the hotel. Around the circle we all participated in "smudging". This was a way of cleansing ourselves. Sage is seen as one of 4 medicines - tobacco, sweet grass, & cedar are the others. We were fanned by the smoke of the dried Sage to cleanse Then we received a small amount of Tobacco wrapped in cloth - we were told to take it home and place it under a tree or a sacred place in our home. The 'grandmothers' told us stories of children committing suicide and other tragedies while we each were

being "smudged. This was quite an experience for all of us to have as they closed the "Walking in Spirit with our Sisters" part of the day. It was no accident we all met today at this Ontario Convention.

He presents in an energetic, joy-filled manner that excites his audience to be fully engaged in his mission. What an exciting and spirit filled key note speaker! He pursued the purpose of our Christianity, tying it in to the purpose of the Catholic Women's League through our mission statement. Ken is a gifted speaker and teacher of our faith!

He reminds us to be on a "first name basis" with God and in turn with those we minister with and to. We need to become a living contact for our communities for Christ. It is important to be POSITIVE and

OPTOMISTIC in all things, and express gratitude at all time. No one gets rewards for complaining. Complaining revolves about selffocus and unhappiness. Instead we must turn things around and express GRATITUDE. Gratitude is not natural for people, it takes work, but, we must provide the opportunity to try this. Gratitude is a matter of choice while emotional response doesn't always utilize rational choices. Choice ... choose to express the choice then go to the feelings. You have control over choices. Four resolutions were passed at the 97th Annual Convention of the Catholic Women's League.

Resolutions passed for National action:

2017.01 Full Implementation of the Supreme Court decision in R. v. Gladue for Indigenous Offenders (from Ontario Provincial council)

This resolution came about from reflection on how many of our aboriginal peoples come before our court system and that many times there are factors over which they had no control which brought them into our court system. A Gladue report is supposed to be submitted addressing these factors but often isn't, so this resolution hopes to rectify this. I have been to several

National conventions but I have never seen such discussion and amendments made on a resolution. The amendments completely changed the intent of the proposal. After much time the amended resolution was defeated and a return made to the original which then passed.

2017.02 Mandatory Age Verification Mechanisms for Adult Pornographic Websites (from B.C. & Yukon Provincial council)

This resolution was passed quite easily since our children need protection from the very easy accessibility to these sites.

2017.03 Zero-rated Status Under the Goods and Services Tax Provisions of the *Excise Tax Act* for Child Safety Products (from

Ontario Provincial council)

This resolution will hopefully prompt the government to get rid of the GST on child safety products.

2017.04 Protection from Coercion of Conscience for Healthcare Professionals (from B.C. & Yukon Provincial council)

This resolution addressed the freedom of conscience and religion for medical care professionals from the view of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

In my future directive this year I will inform you of the action plans for each resolution.

A Catholic Identity Crisis

If we do not know our true identity, we cannot live right. The body doesn't function right because we are listening to a lie.

So where do we look for our identity as a Catholic? Look to the Holy Scriptures and to the church's Catechism.

God-given design:
The church is MISSIONARY
Sent by CHRIST
To ALL NATIONS
To make DISCIPLES
Of them through
EVANGELIZATION.

We are called to be Fishers of People. Christ promises peace in our hearts if we follow him and bring others to him. We are asked to lead, teach and empower others to do the same. It is not the Spirit of Christ that is lacking in our lives, but our response to life that is lacking.

We must learn to nurture our gifts. We must become responsible to the call to communicate these gifts to all people through the love of Jesus Christ. This is evangelization.

When things are not used for their design, they break. This is what is happening in the church. Our gifts are not being utilized properly so

our God-given design is not functioning in unity. We are not focusing on using our gifts to evangelize, and offering others more than the world is offering.

A healthy parish is an evangelizing parish. They look for opportunities to make disciples of all people. We can overcome division and tension by becoming missionaries.

Missionaries are evangelizing for Christ.

We need to respond to challenges within the cultures of today. We need to stop being babysitters, but instead use personal investiture in people to Love, Meet, Listen, Become friends...this is evangelization.

So what is holding us back:

- 1. Lack of evangelizers: evangelizers need to have a personal encounter with Christ in order to proclaim the gospel in a clear and simple way. Invest in a personal relationship with Jesus. We must be constantly proclaiming the message of the Gospel as people need to hear things many times before they buy into it.
- Repetition of Love: as able... over & over how God loves you.
- 3. Confusion on the role of Jesus in our life: to share our faith, we must know how Jesus is relative in our own lives. Investigate in your own heart how Jesus is relevant to us and

- to our church.
- 4. Confusion of "Social Justice" with Evangelization. These are totally different. Don't fool yourself into thinking them the same. Social Justice is giving someone what they are due. Evangelization is proclaiming the Gospel as the center of our lives. Missionary tasks are foremost.

In Acts 2, the disciples are filled with the Spirit, then they went out to evangelize and baptise all.

We must be welcoming to change hearts ... Jesus came for people with problems, He will not deny anyone who calls out to Him. We must share how God has worked in our own lives. Tell people of the miracles that we have seen. Be a river letting information flow and not a reservoir where things become stagnant. Giving is how we receive.

How to evangelize:

- 1. Pray with the person...can we pray right now
- 2. Repeat the pain point the person has shared
- 3. Respond & request healing & God's blessings for the person
- 4. Close prayer.

Young people are especially open to this approach.

Evangelization: bringing people to an encounter with Jesus.

Conquering Fear

My road trip to our National convention was a difficult one for me. I have a phobia of heights and I first noticed this "fear" water. when I was first married. husband and I went on a vacation with my parents and younger siblings which included a visit to Ontario Place in Toronto. My fear was apparent this trip as I literally could not move up the steel grid steps into Ontario Place...that giant orb hovering over Lake Ontario. My father ended up "rescuing" me, carrying me to safety ... into the building! But that meant I had to return to the lakeside to get back to the car. I still remember that day over 4 decades ago like it happened yesterday. Later that same summer, we attended a "party" on the canals at the Lighthouse. The group all knew I was nervous in the water... anyone who has difficulty seeing without their glasses may have the same fear. I am always aware that I cannot see without my glasses, so am afraid to lose them in the water. The group was just itching to dump my canoe into the water...they laughed and laughed when it happened until they saw how panicked I was! Incidents like this happened periodically throughout my life, but I gallantly tried to overcome the panic. Until this summer.

We had a wonderful trip to Montreal. And, then, I made a wrong turn on the freeway and ended up on this very high bridge headed into the central city, and worst over to the north shore of the

St. Lawrence. I knew, of course, this meant another bridge to cross the river somewhere through Quebec. I figured the sooner I crossed, the narrower the river so at Drummondville we crossed the expanded steel suspension bridge! I felt like I was going to fall directly into the water, lose my glasses, and not be a help to myself or anyone else. (never occurred to me that I probably wouldn't survive such a fall!). I made it across with a prayer, and we drove steadily towards New Brunswick.

The mountain roads were beautiful ribbons snaking their way through the forests with glimpses of the mighty St. John River here and there. The bridges on the Trans Canada highway were level and I felt safe. We talked about the Confederation Bridge going into Prince Edward Island but I kept telling myself it was okay since the last bridges didn't give me the crippling fear. Until I got closer to the bridge! The sign said the bridge was 12.5 km and the rise in front of me sent me spiralling I started praying...and praying...and praying...and, to my dismay the bridge went up again with a curve at the top! That's when the fear gripped me completely! My sobs were echoing through the car, and my prayers to our Mother Mary more intense! After 6 decades of the Rosary, we finally made it to land where I said a prayer of thanksgiving. It really was the most fear filled half hour of my life. But I made it!

The remainder of our trip didn't include a lot of bridges, we took the ferry to Nova Scotia so that I didn't face the Confederation Bridge again, and there was one other large bridging structure in Halifax. But God spared me from that experience again!

After hearing Ken Yasinski speak, I know that this was a huge teaching lesson to me from God. And, it also can relate to our work within the Catholic Women's League. It is imperative that we face our fears to grow. We must recognize places in our Leagues where we can influence change, educate others and then empower them to go on to do the will of God. We must give others a chance to succeed and lose the "we've never done it. that way before" attitude. If we are to survive as the wonderful League it is, we must step out from behind our fear of failure, our fear of trying something new, our fear of welcoming others of different backgrounds, faiths, and ages to our table. Because without conquering our fears, we will not be able to change and to grow into the missionary people of God that we are called to be.

Life is a Gift, Love is a choice, Gratitude is a decision. Evangelization is our call.

Dr. Reginald Bibby a Canadian Sociologist spoke to us at the PEI National Convention on "Canada's Catholics"

He has been monitoring social trends in Canada for four decades, and he did a cross-Canada survey of 3,000 Catholics, monitoring the religious and social trends of adults and teenagers. He indicated that religion in Canada is changing but it is not being abandoned. He stated that there are three key things that were apparent.

- 1. Ongoing Identification: The fact that we are talking about this and that 85% of the people continued to identify with one group or another, (Christian or Non-Christian)
- 2. **Polarization:** That there was a solid core of people who continued to embrace religion even at the time when media attention was given to an increase of people who were rejecting it. He stated that

30% embrace it; 45 % are in the middle and 25% reject it..

 Worldwide Religious Vitality: Christianity is the largest in the world slightly ahead of Islam

Bibby did a survey where he asked the question, "I'd be open to more involvement with religious groups if I found it worthwhile." found that many were open to the idea, but had to feel their participation was worthwhile to them and that it would also benefit the family. He stated that faith remained important to Catholics and that some embrace it and some reject it and for some that God is a Being who relates to people. He went on to say that Catholicism is experience, image and story.

Bibby ended by speaking of the CWL, that they are recognized by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops as a lay association of women. That the

CWL serves to unite the Canadian Catholic Women promoting spiritual development, promoting catholic teachings, promoting family life and contributing to social justice.

He has written a book called Canada's Catholics, Vitality and Hope in a New Era





LIFE MEMBERS AND PAST PRESIDENTS SOCIAL JUSTICE AWARD

In the past few years, some of our Life Members have passed away. Following the untimely death of Life Member, Helene Regier, the Diocesan Executive felt we should have some way to recognize the work done by our Life Members and Diocesan Past Presidents. As many of these ladies were involved in or had great concern for social justice issues, it was felt that the most appropriate way we could recognize them would be through the establishment of a Social Justice Award.

The London Diocesan Council of the Catholic Women's League of Canada has established a Social Justice Award to be awarded annually. The award is intended to recognize men or women engaged in social justice work. A person will be eligible to receive the award upon a nomination form being submitted.

Award Criteria:

- 1. Demonstrated involvement in social justice activities
- 2. Nomination by a CWL Council, a pastor or campus minister or equivalent
- 3. The award must be used to finance participation in a reputable social justice activity, either at home or abroad, e.g. Development and Peace, work in inner city or northern experiences
- 4. Priority will be given to someone who identifies with Catholic ideals
- 5. The committee may decide to give the yearly amount to one candidate or divide it among several nominees
- 6. Successful nominees will be asked to share their experience with League members
- 7. Decision of the committee is final

With this award –

- We hope to raise awareness of social justice
- To build solidarity and community to those in need
- To hold as our highest priority, the teachings of the gospels through our concern for the common good and dignity of all human persons
- To bring to light issues around the world and call the world to action on behalf of those who lack this basic human right.
