President's Report-Marie-Theresa Lamphier



Many exciting things have been happening over the course of the last few months. I have been deeply immersed in the role of Diocesan President. . . . all in a good and spiritual way!

The Provincial Convention held in Cobourg, Ontario held many activities to keep us busy and interested. We were treated to many interesting speakers, which included topics on Mental Health, practical ways to move toward God, an interactive workshop entitled "On the Road with Jesus", reciting the rosary together and doing the divine mercy chaplet in song as well as attending many beautiful liturgies. You will find the highlight of the convention as experienced by Joan Lobsinger, the London Regional Chairperson, in a separate article in this issue.

As Diocesan President, I attended my first Provincial Executive meeting and was warmly welcomed by all members around the table. There were some familiar faces and opportunities to make new friends. It was reassuring to see two familiar faces from the London Diocese on the executive – Lucy Hendrikx and Patricia Rivest. This was a time for me to observe the proceedings and learn from the seasoned executive. Their hospitality, warm greetings, and gifts were quite overwhelming!

The National Convention was held in Fredericton, New Brunswick. Here again we were treated to lovely entertainment, good food and warm hospitality. On Monday night the ladies tapped their toes and danced with the band Vinvl12Bits. It was hard not to sing along with the songs they played. A good finish to a day that was filled with thought provoking speakers such as Bishop Robert Morneau, from Green Bay who spoke on "To Live with the Spirit". He talked on how discipleship is grounded in our baptismal call, and our response is to receive God's gifts gratefully, to nurture them responsibly, and to share them justly and sacrificially and to return God's gifts abundantly. We were asked to think about - What do we do after we say we believe? The Holy Spirit is the principal agent of evangelization and our mission is to let everyone know who this God is.

We then learned how Senator Michael Kirby brought the issues of Mental Health and young people to the forefront. He was even surprised that every one of the committee had someone in their family who suffered from some sort of mental illness. You hear a lot of people who talk about the ravaging disease of cancer, but mental illness seems to have a stigma about it and people really don't want to talk about it. We were asked to do whatever we could for children and youth with mental illness. Show government at both levels that grass root Canadians care about our youth and early detection of mental issues. He suggests signing the petition at

and writing letters to your Member of Parliament.

A couple of other speakers that I really found of interest were Imelda Perley and Sheila Issac, who spoke on "Building Relationships with Aboriginal People" a n d Women in "Indigenous Community Leadership Programme" (IWCL). Both these ladies spoke about their history, their culture and what they were doing to help preserve their customs within their families and to educate the general public about their heritage and language. Sheila Issac also spoke about the goal of the IWCL program and how it provides practical skills/experience for Indigenous women and how they can benefit from the experience of established women The intent of this leaders. programme is to support the women and to help them become leaders in order to address issues of murdered indigenous women and lateral violence amongst many other issues that they deal with.

Of course the resolution dialogue is always of interest to me as issues are brought up that I sometimes may not have heard of. Five resolutions were passed at National and these will be outlined in our next League magazine.

One of the highlights was the election of our new national executive. Barbara Dowding is our new National President, with Margaret Ann Jacobs as our new President-Elect and Shari Quinta as our Treasurer. We are truly blessed to have the latter two ladies represent Ontario, as well as Betty *(Continued on page 3)*

Spiritual Advisor—Rev. Father Matt Kucharski

A number of months ago, I sent a survey to all the Parish Spiritual Advisors and Council Presidents. I was very pleased with the quantity of responses. At various times, I hear Advisors expressing concerns about their Councils as well as Presidents expressing concerns about their Advisors. Overall, however, the responses were very favourable. Most of the "issues" seemed to come down to the need for better communication. Ironically, we have more means of communication available to us than ever before, yet we seem worse at communicating than in the past.

I was amazed at the strength of the positive comments that both Advisors and Presidents said of one another. The Spiritual Advisors truly value and appreciate the hard work that the women of the League do, both in the parish and the greater community. Likewise the Presidents appreciate and acknowledge all the efforts that the Advisors do to support the works of the League. Unfortunately, both sides expressed that they did not hear that appreciation too often. When we fail to appreciate the gift of the "other", it can seem like the "other" is taken for granted. One suggestion was the need for Advisors to show their appreciation in some public way, i.e. through the bulletin, a comment at Mass, and so on. On a related note, was the need to inform the parishioners of the breadth of service and faith development that the CWL provides, much beyond the funeral lunches that many in the pew associate the League with.

Another concern expressed was having Advisors at meetings. This can be a challenge due to the Advisor's greater time constraints. However, I found it interesting that a significant proportion of meetings were scheduled at times that were in obvious conflict with a priest's schedule. Having a CWL meeting on Monday, for example, a known "day off" for most priests of this diocese, presents a natural barrier. If the meeting day cannot be changed then maybe we need to find other creative ways for the link between Priest-Advisor and Council to be strengthened. (Continued on page 5)

On Monday work began in earnest with keynote speaker, Ellis Katsof, CEO of Pathstone Foundation who spoke to us on mental illness and in particular how it affects young people. 1st Vice-President—Rebecca McCarrell Resolutions Standing Committee

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What a different summer we have had! Hot, cold, rain, tornadoes, hail! Perhaps it is time we fall back into our routines! The London Diocesan ladies though, have not let this weather stop us from making great strides in our Legislative Process.

In July, at the Ontario Provincial Convention, two resolutions were passed:

2014.01: Mandatory labeling of genetically Modified Food Products

• to urge the federal government to amend the Food and Drugs Act to include the mandatory labeling for all Canadian and imported food and animal feed products that have been genetically modified and or contain genetically modified ingredients

2014.02: Feathers of Hope – Empowering First Nations Youth.

• to urge the Canadian Council of Provincial Child and Youth Advocates to initiate a meeting with all appropriate Provincial and Territorial Ministries, First Nations leaders, First Nations youth and other interested organizations to undertake a similar process to the *Feathers of Hope* in the remaining provinces and territories of Canada

These resolutions will be forwarded to the National CWL. Both of these resolutions in their entirety can be found at <u>www.cwl.on.ca</u> under Resolutions.

In August, at the National

Convention in Fredericton, NB, five resolutions were passed.

2014-01: Restoration of Health Care for Refugee Claimants

• urge the federal government to reinstate health care for all refugee claimants comparable to coverage for Canadians on social assistance.

2014-02: Electronic Cigarettes

- urge the federal government to:
- fully regulate the contents of electronic cigarettes sold in Canada
- fully regulate the marketing, sale and use of electronic cigarettes
- enforce consumer safety standards for electronic cigarettes, and
- implement a national educational campaign warning Canadians of the risks of smoking electronic cigarettes;
- encourage provincial councils to become aware of the issue of electronic cigarettes as it pertains to their province/ territory, and to act on it, as deemed necessary.

2014-03: Flavoured Tobacco Products Ban

- urge the federal government to ban the production and import of Flavoured tobacco products;
- encourage provincial councils to become aware of the issue of Flavoured tobacco products as it pertains to their province/ territory, and to act on it, as deemed necessary/prudent.

2014-04: National Standard for newborn Screening including Screening for Severe Combined Immunodeficiency.

- urge the federal government to implement a national standard for newborn screening including screening for SCID;
- urge provincial councils to become aware of newborn screening including screening for SCID as it pertains to their province/territory, and to act on it, as deemed necessary/prudent.

2014-05: Old Age Security Allowance for Individuals 60 to 64 Years of Age Regardless of Marital Status

• urge the federal government to include all individuals 60 to 64 years of age, regardless of marital status, to be eligible for Old Age Security Allowance.

Our own membership has been busy formulating some resolution topics. So far, there are teams looking at:

- Income Tax Credit for Seniors Participation in Healthy Living Programmes, Arts and Culture
- Retirement Benefits for MP's and MPP's to fit more in line to time of service

- Abortion: the Viability of Life (for 2016)
- Empowering the By Stander to report sexual assaults (for 2016)

Legislation – the committee that puts our resolutions into action; the committee that heads the letter writing campaigns to let our legislature know what action we want to see.

Out of our Resolution Committee meeting this summer, several issues came to the forefront that requires our diligence in following:

> Barriers for and Widening of 401 from Tilbury to High Gate Road. This is one of the most dangerous areas in Ontario to drive. The Ministry of Transportation has released a detailed design that will have the 401 in this area reduced to a single lane for 3 years to rebed and pave the existing road only. Barriers and widening to 6 lanes is not in the plan. This is concerning as the multi-million dollar

project would not address these safety issues at this time, but would be considered for the next phase. Isn't it funny that the highway requires 6 lanes from Windsor to Tilbury and from Hwy 402 to Toronto, but this stretch does not show the need! Where does the traffic go? The barriers are installed in the stretches mentioned above as well...but not needed here! Letters to our MPP's and the Ontario Ministry of Transportation in support of the 6 lane barriered highway is needed Start a campaign in now. your council, parish and neighbourhood!

• Safety concerns of evacuation and fire safety in Nursing Homes, Homes for the Aged, and other Senior residents: after the horrific fire in Quebec this past spring, it has come to light that the safety regulations of smoke alarms, escape plans, etc. do not need to be in place until 2025! Check what's happening in your area...are they safe? Are there enough staff on to evacuate the premises in case of fire? What fire safety plans are in place?

Legislative progress is assisted by letting your MP, MPP, and Ministers of the Government know what you want to see. Petitions, phone calls, email and letter writing campaigns are all part of the process. Start yours today!

This summer brought change in my life. I was told bad news, that I had uterine cancer, but good news, that usually it is slow growing. I was fortunate to have an operation booked in less than a month's time. Yet, as I stood by the receptionist desk, all I could think of was, this is really going to screw up **"my plans"**. It was an "in my face" reminder that my life is not mine and I can be called back at HIS time.

I found it difficult to tell people about my diagnosis. "Cancer" is a word no one wants to hear, even though there have been great strides taken in curing or treating cancer. It still conveys bad outcomes in my mind and pity. I have pride and it is hard for me to show such vulnerability. It was in admitting it, that I received a lot of support and felt lifted up in prayer.

A week after surgery I got the good news that they were able to get all the cancer and no further treatment would be required. What a wonderful feeling! All I needed to do now was have patience and allow my body to heal. I continued to feel the power of prayers for me, from my friends, CWL sisters and my family. Thank you so much.

I was able to have the summer off work and will soon be returning, but it has allowed me to have my precious granddaughter stay with me for most of the summer. What a gift, spending time with each other.

I am excited about our fall regional's, especially the "Spirituality Through Music " component. We have two excellent presenters for that workshop. I hope that many of you will take advantage of their great talent by attending one of the three fall regional's. I love music and singing even though I have no musical training. St. Augustine said "that to sing is to pray twice". Introducing more music to our prayer life is one of my goals as Spiritual Development Chair. Perhaps you could invite members of your choir personally, to this event. They already love music and maybe this is a way to introduce them to a different view of the CWL. One of the comments made at our Masses during convention, is that it is so moving to hear the whole church praying & singing out loud. I hope that everyone does the same in their own parish Masses. Sometimes all a person needs is the encouragement of someone sitting beside them that is singing. We are to be offering ourselves up to God; not attending a performance where we just sit & listen. (except the sermon, of course)

Our CWL day at the shrine in Merlin was well attended and I thank all of the women that came out for this day of prayer. I have never been to Merlin, so it was a wonderful experience for me. If you have never been there before, I urge you to go. They have beautiful grounds and it really does take a long time to walk all the trails. After the National Convention, Mary Jean Horne, Past Diocesan President and I were invited to the Southwestern Ontario Gleaners Open House in Leamington, Ontario. If you recall Gleaners was one of the three organizations that our church collection money was distributed to at our Diocesan Convention in Windsor last April. So on Saturday August 16th, both of us travelled to Learnington to take part in the tour, BBQ and the cheque presentation. We were immediately welcomed by Kandy who is the Office Manager and we were introduced to Jim who is the chair of the Board of Directors.

Jim immediately took us on a personal tour of the very clean plant. He told us a lot about the business and what happens. Most of the food comes from fields where it would normally be left to rot. Volunteers gather the goods and bring it to gleaners where it is

washed and prepared for the dehydration machine. The goods such as dried tomatoes, mushrooms beans, peas and legumes are put into 3 lb. bags where they are distributed to local shelters and food banks. This 3 lb. bag can feed 100 people with a very nourishing soup. То note that all the work is done by volunteers who only work 1/2 day. It takes many volunteers to keep the place running. However, volunteers know how vital it is to feed the hungry.

The machine that was purchased with the portion of the money that the London Diocesan CWL donated was a washer for all the vegetables. The equipment, that Gleaners purchased and refurbished is also done by volunteer electricians and mechanics. Many volunteer hours were put into the refurbishing of this wonderful machine. You can tell it was a labour of love especially when you see how nicely painted and maintained it is now being kept, and we were told it works like a charm!

We want to thank Southwestern Ontario Gleaners for the tour, the BBQ and all the wonderful information given to us on the process they use to gather, clean and package the food products that they utilize to conquer hunger in our community.

Well another summer has passed us by so fast. I hope we all had a restful summer break with our families and friends. Over the summer, I have reflected on how the Community Life Standing Committee could give us some opportunities on how to grow in our faith by serving God's people.

At the 2014 94th Annual National Convention held in Fredericton, New Brunswick, Resolution 2014.01 Restoration of Health Care for Refugee Claimants was passed. In 2012, the federal government made cuts to the Interim Federal Health Programme which provided basic health care to refugee claimants since 1957 such as vision, dental and prescription. Health care is a basic human right, according to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The resolution urges the federal government to reinstate health care for all refugee claimants comparable to coverage for Canadians on social assistance. With the passing of the above mentioned resolution, as CWL members we should follow through on the required action of writing letters to members of parliament and members of legislative assemblies and voice their opinion on this matter.

Vatican City, 31 July 2014 (VIS) Pope Francis' universal prayer intention for August is: "That refugees, forced by violence to abandon their homes, may find a generous welcome and the protection of their rights". See National Website at <u>www.cwl.ca</u> for the full details of this resolution.

Development and Peace - a news article states that at Development and Peace, they believe that there is room at the table for all. However, 1 billion people are still suffering from hunger, that's 1 in 8 people of the entire human family! This fall, Development and Peace continues to answer the call of Pope Francis to fight the global scandal of hunger, by launching an education campaign about the role of women and men family farmers in fighting hunger. Under the slogan "Sow Much Love", the goal of the campaign is to educate Canadians about the role of family farmers as stewards of the world's seeds, and to call on Canadians to take action to support the rights of farmers in the face of the growing threat of corporate control of seeds. The Catholic Women's League has partnered with Development and Peace by supporting thousands of women and children in the Global South through the 1% programme. Many of our members have contributed 1% of all personal and luxury items as well as 1% of funds raised by CWL councils to D&P projects. Please donate generously to this very important Canadian Catholic organization.

Human Trafficking—There has been arrests in this area, which have led to convictions. But this is not enough! We need to support the victims of human trafficking in our area whenever and wherever possible. We could try to get guest speakers from our areas to come and speak to our councils. This does not happen just in Canada but all over the world. Look at what happened in Nigeria when 276 Nigerian girls were kidnapped. We must pray that they do not become part of the human trafficking process. I was so appalled when I read this in the paper and heard it on the news. We must be aware of what is going on around us.

Mary Jane A Yaeger, Provincial Community Life Standing Chairperson stated in her Convention Report that a person that made a lasting impression on her was Sr. Dorothy Goetz, a member of the School, Sister's of Notre Dame. She co-initiated the School "Sister's Stop Human Trafficking" committee in Waterdown. They have been working to raise awareness about the issue, especially the sexual exploitation of women and children. Mary Jane remembers a very petite woman standing in front of a group of people giving the straight story on human trafficking. She held nothing back and told it like it wasis! She presented her information in a quiet, concise manner. She fought her social justice fight for men, women and children of varying ages and education.

Check with your school or your School Board in your area to see if further help with this can be given. Maybe have an evening session for other parents to learn how to protect their children and computer from internet violence.

Why do we collect used stamps? Submitted by Cam Cadotte, Corresponding Secretary

Why do we collect used stamps?

When I collect the stamps that are given to me I then give them to volunteers in Chatham. They are trimmed then sent to Leprosy Mission Canada where they are checked and packaged in 25 pound bags then sold to dealers.

Money received by Leprosy Mission Canada is used to supply medicine, care and rehabilitation to those suffering from leprosy, and to help finance care wherever leprosy is found.

There are approximately 500 people in Canada with the leprosy virus. They contracted this virus prior to coming to Canada. Leprosy is not highly contagious and is curable. Last year our donors helped cure over 30 people by sending us their trimmed, used postage stamps.

How it works:

- Trim your stamps to ¼ x 1/2 inch
- No need to sort your stamps by country or type
- Postcards or entire envelopes dated prior to 1950 are sought after, please do not remove the stamps
- All foreign stamps are accepted
- Dealers are particularly interested in the special commemorative issues of Canadian/American postage stamps

- Please do not send postage metre imprints, or damaged stamps
- You do not need to soak the stamps off the envelopes

I will also accept used eye glasses/ sunglasses. These are sent to a local optometrist to be calibrated then sent to third world countries through Canadian Food for Children.

What a privilege to attend the national convention on your behalf. Marie-Theresa Lamphier and I were joined by Mary Lappan, Mary Bannon and Pat Rivest for a time of faith, fun and fulfillment, as well as being accompanied by Fr. Matt Kucharski.

Our time started well with being greeted at the airport in Toronto by some ladies from BC who were happy to see more CWL ladies! They had taken the red eye flight from Vancouver so were a little tired.

Once we had registered at our hotel, then made the trip to the convention centre to register for the actual convention, we hopped on board a bus for a tour of the city - a city of just 60,000 people. There is so much history in Fredericton and we also learnt a lot about Lord Beaverbrook. Many buildings were made of wood as logging is the main industry and as a result the city has experienced many fires. The bus delivered us to the Monsignor Boyd Centre where we enjoyed a lobster dinner and down east entertainment including the Sista's of St. Patrick!

Sunday saw us up early and hopping on another bus for a trip to King's Landing which is a historical project. We visited the print shop where they still do printing for the village and also the sash & window company. We got to see how they planed the wood and learnt it only cost \$1,200 to build a house - wouldn't that be nice! After visiting some other buildings we entered the King's Head for a delicious lunch of homemade buckwheat bread, homemade butter, turkey stew and dessert. We arrived back at the convention centre in time for the resolutions dialogue. The resolutions committee had received 16 resolutions but only 5 were being brought to the floor of the convention. Following the dialogue we attended the opening mass at St. Dunstan's Church.

Monday began on a sad note when we learnt that a member from Manitoba had passed away in her sleep. Mass was subsequently said for her intention.

We had 2 keynote speakers on Monday. Bishop Robert Morneau spoke on the theme "To Live With The Spirit" while Senator Michael Kirby spoke on "Mental Health and Young People". Fr. Philip Kennedy intended to talk on Catholic Missions in Canada, but he was unable to attend due to ill health.

Bishop Morneau reminded us that we need to receive God's gifts gratefully and be grounded in the gift of the Holy Spirit. He spoke on 3 books: 1. All Saints by Robert Ellsbert; 2. 7 Habits of Highly Effective People by Steve Covey; 3. A Game Plan for Life by John Woodham. Mr. Woodham's game plan included:

- 1. Be true to yourself
- 2. Make each day your masterpiece
- 3. Help others, serve your church and community
- 4. Drink deeply from good books
- 5. Make friendship a fine art
- 6. Pray for guidance life is tough
- 7. Give thanks for our blessings. We are Eucharistic people.

Senator Kirby told us there were 11 senators sitting around talking about their own experiences with family and friends with mental illness. Everyone one of them had had a connection with someone who had had a mental illness. All had previously known of the physical illnesses in the families but had been unaware of the mental issues as it is not

something often talked about. We cannot let mental health slip back into the shadows. Ten percent of adults with mental illness had started in their 20's. Only 25% of young people get the help they need and many of them end up in jail and/or on social assistance. Also, suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among young people. Mental illness costs \$1.5 million in lost jobs each year. Those suffering with mental illness used to be put into "insane asylums" then when the government closed these, they were released into the community with no help. Senator Kirby said that in 75-80% of youth it starts as a "mood disorder" and with treatment right away, they can cope. It can take 12 - 18 months to get help for the child. Australia is the only country with a national mental health programme. What can we do? Go to www.rightbyyuu.ca and sign the petition, write letters to vour MPs - show government that this is of interest to the grassroots level. Senator Kirby

finished by having us all pray a Hail Mary for those young people suffering from mental illness.

On Tuesday Betty Anne Brown-Davidson welcomed everyone to the convention. Greetings were brought by Bishop McGrattan, The Ukrainian Catholic Women's League, Glenda Klein on behalf of W.I.C.C. and the American National Council of Women. Imelda Perley spoke on "Building Relationship with Aboriginal Women" and told us we need to learn about the natives in our communities/ regions. Sheila Isaac from Quebec spoke to us on a programme run by the Coady International Institute "Indigenous Women in Community Leadership Programme". Sheila told us to ask MLA's to include aboriginal history into the education system and also ask our MPs what they are doing for the environment, land and aboriginal peoples.

Following the speakers the giving of reports began. Then

members from each province went to separate restaurants to enjoy dinner.

Wednesday saw the voting on the 5 resolutions – details can be found on the national website and will also be published in the League magazine. Shari Guinta provided us with a list of those resolutions that have now been archived.

A large contingent from BC issued an invitation to all to attend the 95th convention in Vancouver, August 16-19th, 2015.

Elections were held and the new theme was announced by incoming president, Barbara Dowding.

There were 585 people in attendance at the convention which closed with Mass again at St. Dunstan's Church.

Oral Report for 67th Annual Provincial Convention -Cobourg—July 2014—Communications Chair

Madame Chair,

The League's involvement in the national campaign to obliterate pornography and its effects on society are well known by members and non-members alike. The National Pornography Hurts Campaign continues to show our legislators how we feel. As the social justice project of this communications chair it has been my goal to educate our members on what pornography is - not the graphic, sexual pictures and videos - but the science of the addiction. By better understanding the brain and the effects of pornography on the brain we, as members, can focus our prayers and support on the real problem.

Pornography constitutes about 25% of all search engine requests and is the fourth most common reason people give for going on the internet. The simple truth is that pornography has profound consequences for the brain and acts

in many ways like a drug. With prolonged exposure to pornography your tolerance is increased and people find themselves addicted. It leads to general feelings of loss of control and compulsive behaviour, despite any negative consequences. As well, they go through withdrawal when the stimulation is taken away.

<u>(())</u>

The issue is that continued exposure can cause long term or even lifelong neuroplastic change in the brain. Dopamine is a hormone and neurotransmitter that plays many important roles in the human brain and body. Dopamine plays a major role in reward-motivating behaviour – so the more stimulation, the more dopamine is produced and the more stimulation is required – therefore creating the circle of addiction much the same as gambling and running.

There are many articles available

on the internet related to the scientific studies specific to the effects of pornography on our society. We can educate... but what do we do about it?

Through understanding, compassion and open conversation about what is acceptable we can support those who suffer. We can make our views known through letter-writing. But... our most powerful weapon is prayer – prayerful support of those addicted, prayerful support of victims of the industry and prayerful support of the many who are working towards the eradication of this addiction.

This concludes my report.


I would like to thank the presidents of the Essex Region for their support


<u>TO THOSE OF US BORN 1930–1979</u>





Norman King, B.A., S.T.B., M.A., Ph.D.

Norman King is the Stephen Jarislowsky Chair in Religion and Conflict, Assumption University, Windsor and Director of Theology and Acting Principal, Iona College, Windsor, Ontario. He is a board member of numerous organizations in the Windsor and Essex area, including the Windsor Essex Children's Aid Society, the Windsor Homes Coalition, Unicorn, and he is the treasurer for the Windsor University Retirees Association.

Norman has taught, written, and lectured over a wide range of themes and topics for the past thirty years. He was educated at Toronto and Laval universities in Western literature and philosophy, with doctoral studies in systematic theology and contemporary religious though and spirituality. He has focused especially on the human quest for meaning in the twentieth century in its personal, interpersonal and social dimensions, with some emphasis on the work of German theologian Karl Rahner and American essayist Thomas Merton.

His courses have included themes in religion and spirituality in dialogue with ritual studies, literature, psychology and sociology. In more recent years, he has expanded his teaching areas to include Greek mythology, Canadian multiculturalism and spirituality and music. Norman has authored two books and numerous articles, chiefly in the area of contemporary spiritual thought, ethics and business and music and spirituality. He continues to teach and write in these areas.

In connection with the Stephen Jarislowsky Chair, he has coordinated an Interfaith Group and organized symposia on peace, attitudes to children, the role of women and the changing role of men, with perspectives from representatives of major religious tradition. He has also given public lectures on "Thomas Merton on Non-Violence" and "Karl Rahner on Interfaith Dialogue and Peace."

Jane Ripley, Honours B.Mus., CHM, RMT

Music Teacher, Choral Director and Workshop Clinician Professor, Spirituality and Music, Iona College, Windsor, ON.

Jane obtained an Honours Bachelor of Music degree in vocal music from the University of Windsor. She also holds a diploma in Church Music from the same institution, where she remained on the Dean's Honour roll each year and was awarded the Board of Governors' for excellence upon graduation.

Jane maintains a private voice, piano and theory studio in Chatham, Ontario, and is currently the President of the Chatham-Kent branch of the Ontario Registered Music Teachers' Association. She is also a qualified elementary school teacher. Over the past many years, Jane has directed several vocal ensembles and community and church choirs. As we think ahead to fall and piemaking, members and parishioners have been invited to freeze extra rhubarb, strawberries or blueberries harvested during the summer for inclusion in our yummy fruit pies. The pies will not only kick off our fall fund-raising efforts, but bring back memories of those glorious summer days of freshly picked fruit and sunshine.

There is one group in our midst that does not stop, even for summer! Every Thursday, you will find them in the meeting room at the church working away at a variety of projects. The St. Michael Quilters Group was created almost 12 years ago and continues to flourish today. There are a dozen or so ladies involved in the group at any one time. They bring their sewing machines and talents to the room each week and share ideas, brainstorm problems and praise accomplishments. Their day is informal and is governed by the needs of the group. They make beautiful quilts that are sent to the northern Aboriginal community of Pikangikum each year. In their first year, 30 guilts were created and shipped, with 10 to 15 more following each subsequent year. Ouilts are also offered for sale at the annual St. Michael CWL fall bazaar. The proceeds from the sales help to pay for shipping costs to the north and to assist in the purchasing of supplies identified by social workers in the northern community. Their abilities reach far beyond quilts as the ladies produce table runners, place mats, coasters, aprons, coffee holders and any trendy items that are proving to be popular, for the fall bazaar. These sewers set aside two days each summer where they sew items exclusively for the bazaar and two days when they work on personal projects. Pot luck lunches add to the social atmosphere that prevails in the room. This very inclusive group is always happy to welcome a new sewer to their circle. They have not hidden their talents under a bushel but rather have allowed them to shine forth for the benefit of their community and beyond.

Life Members and Past Presidents Social Justice Award

This year our Council nominated member Vera Lawlor for the Life Members and Past Presidents Social Justice Award to be presented at the CWL Diocesan Convention in April, 2014. This award recognizes dedication to and advocacy for Social Justice causes. She has been a bundle of energy as she has chaired and served on the boards of many committees including: Canadian Catholic Organization for Development & Peace (CCODP); YMCA International Development Committee; Sarnia Lambton Committee Against Trafficking of Women and Children; OBIOMA Relief Organization of Canada; Justice Group of St. Michael Parish; and St. Michael Quilters Group.

Vera said her decision to become involved in social justice began as a New Year's resolution many years ago, " to become more involved in my community and pay back all the many benefits I get from my community and live out my Catholic faith at the same time". She says her heartstrings are pulled daily by the deplorable and unimaginable third world living conditions of Canada's aboriginal children. After hearing Mike Stevens, world renowned harmonica virtuoso, talk about the impact of his music workshops to children in the northern Native communities, she knew she needed to do something. Thus began the project to make quilts for the people in the northern community o f Pikangikum. She has also organized mitten, hat and sock drives at local elementary schools; sending these items to the community at Christmas time. Another aspect of her social justice is driving migrant workers to monthly masses and socials in Lambton Deanery. Many migrant workers arrive in our area (Continued on page 36)

each year, leaving family behind so they can earn enough money to keep their families living in poor countries from poverty. She works tirelessly to educate people about the evil of human trafficking and how to end this world-wide criminal activity. Her fund-raising efforts know no bounds: supporting bazaars and bake sales; working with friends to create solidarity soup lunches; established poinsettia fund-raising sales; organizing a multicultural food event, and coordinating an annual dinner & dance. Finally, each December Vera's family invites friends and family to their home for a Christmas carol sing-along, food and fellowship. Instead of a hostess gift, guests are asked to make a donation to Artscan Circle.

"I don't have any wise words of wisdom about working for justice in our world,

but what I can say is that it just feels like the right and only thing to do and because I can do it, I will."

And the ladies efforts were certainly appreciated by the Hospice Board. "It was so much fun." said Jennifer Wilson, Chair of the Chatham Kent Hospice Board.



Those CWL people are hard workers ... a really nice group of people," the Charing Cross area resident said.

Burk said the CWL raises funds throughout the year to various events, such as raffles, Lenten luncheons, and it's annual pennysale.

We raise funds for St. Anne's School, if children need book bags, mittens or hats, or whatever, we provide the money." Burk said.

"We support the Soup Kitchen, the Food Bank ... wherever there's a need in the community, we try to help them out."

Burk said the idea to host a dinner to support the Hospice came up during it's April monthly meeting after a member brought up a story about the project in The Blenheim News Tribune.

And in just six short weeks after voting in favour of supporting the Hospice, dinner was on the table.

Burk said the CWL was amazed at the support of the community. "All tickets were sold, but not everyone attended. But that's the thing we always find with our community, people are so supportive." Burk said. "People were just buying tickets, and some said 'I can't go, but I want to buy tickets anyway' to support the cause."

Burk said the CWL is also grateful for all the local businesses that donated merchandise and gift certificates to the raffle table, which brought in \$756.00.

After dinner, Wilson gave the crowd of over 300 people a presentation on the Hospice, which will be built beside the St. Andrew's Residence in central Chatham.

"It was a little nerve racking speaking in your home town where everyone knows you," said Wilson, with a smile. "But everyone was very kind and very receptive." Wilson and other board members have been busy appearing at numerous functions throughout the municipality to raise funds—and just as important raise awareness for the hospice.

Friday night's CWL dinner was the second of 3 events in a week's time in the Blenheim area. "It's good for us to get the message out about what this residential hospice will bring to the community and who will benefit," Wilson said. "There are still a lot of people who don't understand." "It's not just for the dying person, it's not just for old people, it's for the whole family," she explained. Wilson also told the audience how volunteers will plav a vital role. "It takes a tremendous amount of volunteers

to run a hospice," she said. "Once people understand what is required, there is probably a way for anyone who wants to help, can help."

Wilson said it is important for the Hospice Board to get volunteers in place early because of special training that is required.

The Chatham Kent Hospice will be a 10-bed facility with a meeting room, bereavement counsel room and resource library.

The total price of the project is \$5million, as \$3-million will be a sustainability fund for the first 2 years of operation while a foundation is set up.

Last Week, the Hospice board announced it had reached the \$1.5million mark in fund-raising it needed to receive a matching \$1.5million from the Chatham-Kent municipal community initiative fund, which begins with a \$160,000 payment in 2015 and \$335,000 annually from 2016-2019.

"It's amazing we've raised that much already, but we still have a long way to go," Wilson said. "We don't want people to think that by any means are we near the finish line, because we are not. We still have a lot of money to raise."

Ground-breaking on the Hospice is expected to begin this fall and will be open sometime next year.

LIFE MEMBERS AND PAST PRESIDENTS SOCIAL JUSTICE AWARD

In the past few years, some of our Life Members have passed away. Following the untimely death of Life Member, Helene Regier, the Diocesan Executive felt we should have some way to recognize the work done by our Life Members and Diocesan Past Presidents. As many of these ladies were involved in or had great concern for social justice issues, it was felt that the most appropriate way we could recognize them would be through the establishment of a Social Justice Award.

The London Diocesan Council of the Catholic Women's League of Canada has established a Social Justice Award to be awarded annually. The award is intended to recognize men or women engaged in social justice work. A person will be eligible to receive the award upon a nomination form being submitted.

Award Criteria:

- 1. Demonstrated involvement in social justice activities
- 2. Nomination by a CWL Council, a pastor or campus minister or equivalent
- 3. The award must be used to finance participation in a reputable social justice activity, either at home or abroad, e.g. Development and Peace, work in inner city or northern experiences
- 4. Priority will be given to someone who identifies with Catholic ideals
- 5. The committee may decide to give the yearly amount to one candidate or divide it among several nominees
- 6. Successful nominees will be asked to share their experience with League members
- 7. Decision of the committee is final

With this award -

- We hope to raise awareness of social justice
- To build solidarity and community to those in need
- To hold as our highest priority, the teachings of the gospels through our concern for the common good and dignity of all human persons
- To bring to light issues around the world and call the world to action on behalf of those who lack this basic human right.
