President's Report—Marie-Theresa Lamphier



As I write this article, I am sitting in the Vancouver airport waiting for my flight home. I reflect on a wonderful convention...my last National Convention as Diocesan President. It was certainly amazing with great speakers, inspiring messages and the views were just awesome! One can really appreciate the wonder of God's creation with his beautiful mountains that peak over the clouds, the wonderful waterways and the amazing weather (while Ontario is enduring a heat wave). It is always good to renew relationships and make new friends. The entertainment at these conventions are always fun and the food was amazing! I would be remiss if I did not mention the wonderful hospitality of the British Columbia/Yukon members of the Catholic Women's League.

This summer has been absolutely amazing and wonderfully busy, as some of us attended the Provincial Convention in Niagara Falls. Once again, we had wonderful speakers. Keynote speakers Dr. Josephine Lombardi and Dr. Moira McQueen packed quite a message. Lombardi was also the Keynote speaker in Vancouver, so we were doubly inspired as she had the opportunity to provide a longer presentation on our theme "One Heart, One Voice, One Mission! Dr. Lombardi reminded us that we must do all things with great love; to use our gifts to do God's Work and to use our Voices to bring about his prophetic message to the world. When we know ourselves and become a better version of ourselves, we become more like God as he lives in our hearts. A heart that knows Christ is irresistible to others. Our minds and bodies will follow.

Bishop Gary Gordon, at National, was a delight to listen to as he talked about his younger days and the events that led him to work in the Northern Missions. message was humorous and inspiring as he talked about a few of the CWL councils, thousands of miles apart with only five members who would raise thousands of dollars so that they could build a church! They are faith-filled women who have a mission to do God's work. We really need to support Catholic Missions in Canada!

Dr. McQueen, at Provincial, talked to us about dying with dignity in light of the Supreme Court ruling on Euthanasia. More people need to be aware of the services that are available when one of our loved ones has been diagnosed with a terminal disease.

We also listened to a beautiful presentation from Carol Mullins of "Quiet Whispers Ministry". Carol writes words to scripture and plays them with her guitar. We are called to quietly reflect on the words and thoughts while she is playing. It was another method of bringing us closer to some of the passages in the Bible.

One of the highlights and fun activities at the Provincial Convention was the presentation and invitation to the 2016 Provincial Convention in Stratford.

Dara Hartman, one of the co-chairs was the Town Crier and Mary Bannon, the other co-chair, led the Swan (Fr. Matt Kurcharski) and the swan parade down to the front of the convention hall as all London CWL members who were in attendance sang the song prepared by Theresa Ryan to the tune of "God Created Earth and Heaven". Pamphlets on Stratford were handed out while a video prepared by Rebecca McCarrell and the committee was shown. We received many compliments on the whole presentation.

Another highlight and one that the Diocese of London should be very proud of is the presentation of the resolution ON 15-04 "Provision of Regulated Housing for the Chronic, Severely Mentally Ill". This resolution was passed at our Diocesan Convention, so many of you are aware of it and was also discussed and carried at the Provincial Convention. Congratulations to St. Michael's Council in London and to Rebecca McCarrell and the Resolution Committee for a job well done!

Elections were also held at this convention. I am pleased to report that Pauline Krupa is our new President, Anne Madden - President Elect and Colleen Randall - First Vice President. It is with joy that we congratulate Patricia Rivest from the London Diocese as the new Treasurer. We wish her well in this new endeavour. There were many people running this year and of

We however want to thank them for their commitment to the League and allowing their name to stand for this year's election. The expression of faith by the participants through our liturgies and informal discussions over the years has given me new insights

into God and my own faith journey.

I am impressed by the dedication and hard work of the many women who attend, a number of whom use vacation time to be part of these gatherings. The conviction of the women that I have encountered at these conventions has been very strong. The League has taken on some significant and serious issues through their resolutions. They are always well thought out, well researched, and there is a history of resolutions making a difference in our country and society. 1st Vice-President—Rebecca McCarrell Resolutions Standing Committee



It was my pleasure to attend the 68th Annual Ontario Provincial CWL Convention in Niagara Falls representing the London Diocese as 1st Vice President and Resolutions Chairperson as well as being an accredited voting member of St. Francis Xavier Council, Tilbury.

The Resolutions Dialogue is an important part of any convention. It is where you meet in round table discussions of 10-12 persons to discuss the resolutions being presented at the convention. This year there were 5 resolutions of which #4 was our London Diocese Resolution LON.2015.01 Regulated Housing for the Chronic Severely Mentally Ill. During discussions you get to question wording, reasoning, resources and anything to do with the resolution. At the end of the discussion time, vou are able to write motions of changes you would like to see, or provide "housekeeping" information (correcting grammar, spelling, order of points, etc). It is a really interesting and informative process and I would recommend everyone to attend these sessions whenever possible. This is our legislation at work!

I am reporting on the day of resolutions, Tuesday, July 7, 2015

Our morning started with the beautiful celebration of Mass! The celebration was enhanced by the number of Spiritual Advisors concelebrating, the choir from Betty Colaneri's own parish, and

the prayerful peace of sharing with other members.

Our National President, Barbara Dowding (from my former parish of St. Augustine's, Vancouver) brought greetings from the national office and members from across Canada. In her address, Barbara asked us to accept our own gifts and use them for others. She also asked that we not keep our enthusiasm for the League and all its works in the room, but to take it to our parishes, and communities...and use it to evangelize to others! Show others that we are more than the "kitchen" ladies but are competent women reaching out to others with faith, fun, and fellowship. Our works in social justice must be the catalyst to include the next generation in our work.

The afternoon brought the resolutions to the floor. Five were presented, and after much debate, changes, and finally voting these five resolutions will be passed on to various levels:

ON.15.01: Ban Products Containing Plastic Microbeads in Personal Care Products

ON.15.02: Banning the Use of Neonictinoid Pesticides

ON.15.03: Mandatory Police Vulnerable Sector Check Screening, Training and Supervision for Minors

ON.15.04: Regulated Housing for the Chronic, Severely Mentally Ill *Presented by: London Diocese* Passed and now goes to Ontario Government for a Private Members Bill in September 2015. Accepted by National for distribution to all provinces, territories and military ordinances.

ON.15.05: Reinstatement of Mandatory Long Form Census

Although our afternoon stretched the session by 2 hours, the convention center did wonders in turning the room around for our celebratory banquet. The usual piper was replaced by a trumpeter, and the outgoing provincial council members and life members led by President Betty Colaneri danced their way to their seats! Such a great time!

Please plan to attend the 2016 Provincial Convention hosted by London Diocese in July 2016 in the beautiful town of Stratford. It is a great experience where friends meet, and work towards our mission in serving the people of God!

<u>Lessons learned from our</u> resolution!

- When looking at resolutions at the resolution session, remember that <u>ONLY</u> the <u>"be</u> <u>it resolved"</u> clauses can be changed.
- * The "whereas" clauses contain the facts that the writing council has obtained. They are substantiated in the brief

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- and the resource materials. The wording cannot be changed as it will then not match the research.
- 2. Changes to the resolution are presented to the resolution committee <u>AT THE END OF</u> <u>THE RESOLUTION</u> <u>DIALOGUE SESSION.</u>
- They must be presented on the proper motion sheet (we will have them at the convention for next year)
- * The change must be presented on the motion sheet at the end of the resolution dialogue session so that the resolution committee can assess them before presentation to the assembly.
- * The persons who presented the changes must be available to support their motions, then be

- at the resolution presentation at the convention to bring forth their motions. It is advisable to be able to speak to why you want these changes. Housekeeping issues do not need to be presented as motions. They should be addressed to the resolution chairperson as Housekeeping issues. These would include grammar, spelling, and punctuation corrections.
- 3. At the resolution presentation during convention, be prepared to speak to the resolution either for or against, ensuring you can explain why you agree or disagree with the topic being presented.

- 4. Come prepared.
- 5. Look for changes in your daily life that could lead to a resolution!

Welcome back after a wonderful summer of relaxation, fun, and spending much needed time and catch up with the family. I have had the pleasure to take a pilgrimage to Midland, Ontario to the Martyrs shrine. The last time this was done, I was in my teens. I was able to view this with new eyes and an open heart.

As I travelled to Midland, I have had the chance to visit many towns along the way. There is so much beauty in our province. It was sad to see the areas where the weather did not cooperate for the farmers and many areas that are rich and abundant. Everything depends on the rain and the warmth of the sun, and how much we receive to produce the crops. We experienced some power winds. The day after we came home, we heard that the little town of Minto had a tornado touchdown causing lots of damage. Mother Nature is certainly giving us some wicked weather.

While on another trip to Gaspe, we travelled through the town Lac-Mégantic. FYI: The Lac-Mégantic rail disaster occurred in the town of Lac-Mégantic on July 6, 2013, when an unattended 74-car freight train carrying Bakken formation crude oil rolled down a 1.2% grade hill from Nantes and derailed in downtown, resulting in the fire and explosion of multiple tank cars. Forty-two people were confirmed dead, with five more missing and presumed dead. More than 30 buildings in the town's centre, roughly half of the downtown area, were destroyed and all but three of the thirty-nine remaining downtown buildings are to be demolished due to petroleum contamination of the town site. Today, much of the devastation has been cleared up, but the town is still trying to build itself up.

Overall, the sites I have seen on our excursions have been so beautiful. The scenery was picturesque especially travelling along the Lake Huron, Georgian Bay and the St. Lawrence. God has created a great masterpiece for our viewing. Our country is so blessed.

But all is not as it seems. Global warming-climate change is affecting everyone in the world, even in Canada and some countries such as ours in the end will likely feel the greatest affects. Much of the change in the weather is due to global warming, jet stream patterns, tides...., but most of all through pollution. It is not just in this part of the world but all over. I think of the people in the Third World, especially in Haiti, Africa, South America, Asia that are going through devastating climate change, especially earthquakes, drought, monsoons, torrential rain falls, mudslides, etc. How can these people survive when there is so much disaster? How can we help?

We need to look at the way we use the resources of the Earth. We can change little things like recycling, growing gardens for our own use or growing crops and vegetables for the needy. God gave us all the necessary things to make our lives sustainable – good soil, good air, rain to grow food, trees to provide shade, water to drink, plants that provide medicinal purposes for our needs. If the land becomes polluted with chemicals; mining procedures; cutting trees to make way for building cities, we are defeating God's purpose. We need to take care of the Earth. i.e. if we cut down trees, we should plant another in its place. He made this Earth for all of us.

In Pope Francis's encyclical "Laudato Sii" or "Be Praised" it calls for an urgent action to tackle the current ecological crisis and address inequalities. Pope Francis invites us to put the poorest at the centre, the ones who are not responsible for the terrible consequences of climate change on people's lives and have fewer resources to react. The encyclical on care of our common home makes a call for a transformational change that will allow all human beings to live sustainably in dignity.

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Ontario Provincial Convention—July 4/8th, 2015— Niagara Falls, Ontario, Submitted by: Angela Pellerin, Diocesan Pres. Elect

This year the provincial convention was held at the Americana Conference Resort & Spa in Niagara Falls. On the Saturday evening we enjoyed the Greg Frewin Theatre and Sunday morning rode a double-decker bus. We visited the famous falls and the beautiful butterfly conservatory before experiencing the peace of the Mt. Carmel Spiritual Retreat Centre. We returned to the Americana in time for the resolutions dialogue. The opening Mass was celebrated at Our Lady of the Scapular Church.

I was asked to report on the first day of the actual convention. In the morning the keynote speaker was Josephine Lombardi, PhD who is the author of several books. Josephine spoke on an encounter as it relates to our theme "One Heart, One Voice, One Mission". She told us we need to know Christ's heart, voice and mission before we can encounter our own. Iosephine spoke of Mary and Elizabeth and the news given to each that they were to bear a child. They were united in one heart and one voice. All of us run into someone who we connect with in a spiritual way - we feel connected to them and it brings us peace. She told us we have to become another Mary before we can be another Christ. The less we sin, the more Christ becomes visible in our life. Our mission is to encounter Christ and is based on our individual gifts. Josephine told us to ask ourselves "Where do I flourish? What are my gifts?" We as women are sensitive to human needs and can act on them. Our mission is to reveal lesus to others which we can do through our leadership. Leadership is not limited to ordained ministry - women have a part to play.

In the afternoon Moira McQueen, LLB, MDiv, PhD, DSL did a presentation on palliative care. Moira spoke on the difference between assistance in dying and assistance to die. All Canadians should have access to quality endof-life care. Hospice is whole person care intended to make the person more comfortable and have quality of life in their final days. Hospice includes physical, psychological, social and spiritual care. Palliative care does not exclude assisted suicide. Moira said young people accept their

impending death better than adults. Adults tend to deny death out of their fear. We need to know what assistance and benefits are available and when we need to access the help. This is sometimes difficult as it is difficult to know for sure how long the person has left to live. She said we need to stop thinking of the time but instead think of the needs of the person from the time assessed as palliative. Very few people needing palliative care gets it. On average, caregivers give 57 hours a week to care for a dving loved one. There needs to be an improved team approach to palliative care. C.O.L.F. has a national campaign which can be found on their website.

Twenty-nine members (including Fr. Matt Kucharski) from London diocese enjoyed dinner together before returning to the hotel to be entertained by Sandy Vine and band.

Teach us to share with others, at home and abroad, the good things you have given us In praying for the ability and opportunities to share the good things with others, do I extend this to include some of my most precious gifts and talents as well as my material treasures? Do I try to understand what it is like to be always on the receiving end? Can I accept and forgive when my efforts to share are not always appreciated? Do I thank God constantly that I have things to share?

This we ask through Our Lord Jesus Christ Am I always aware of the power of these works? Do I appreciate the tradition of our Catholic faith which encourages us to call on the name of Jesus Christ?

And the intercession of our Patroness, Our Lady of Good Counsel To ask Our Lady of Good Counsel to intercede is to truly believe in the closeness of the relationship between Jesus and Mary. Am I constantly striving to discover Mary's true role within the life and growth of the church?

LIFE MEMBERS AND PAST PRESIDENTS SOCIAL JUSTICE AWARD

In the past few years, some of our Life Members have passed away. Following the untimely death of Life Member, Helene Regier, the Diocesan Executive felt we should have some way to recognize the work done by our Life Members and Diocesan Past Presidents. As many of these ladies were involved in or had great concern for social justice issues, it was felt that the most appropriate way we could recognize them would be through the establishment of a Social Justice Award.

The London Diocesan Council of the Catholic Women's League of Canada has established a Social Justice Award to be awarded annually. The award is intended to recognize men or women engaged in social justice work. A person will be eligible to receive the award upon a nomination form being submitted.

Award Criteria:

- 1. Demonstrated involvement in social justice activities
- 2. Nomination by a CWL Council, a pastor or campus minister or equivalent
- 3. The award must be used to finance participation in a reputable social justice activity, either at home or abroad, e.g. Development and Peace, work in inner city or northern experiences
- 4. Priority will be given to someone who identifies with Catholic ideals
- 5. The committee may decide to give the yearly amount to one candidate or divide it among several nominees
- 6. Successful nominees will be asked to share their experience with League members
- 7 Decision of the committee is final

With this award –

- We hope to raise awareness of social justice
- To build solidarity and community to those in need
- To hold as our highest priority, the teachings of the gospels through our concern for the common good and dignity of all human persons
- To bring to light issues around the world and call the world to action on behalf of those who lack this basic human right.
