Pat Rivest, Shirley George Trucy Cornelis and I had the

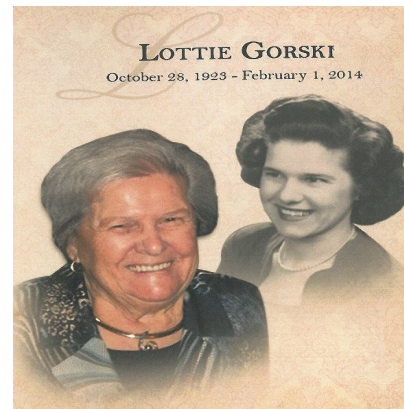
privilege of attending her 90th birthday last October.

As we know, the church is not just a humanly created institution, but part of God's divine plan. It is not simply programmes and ministries and buildings and hierarchical structures. These are various elements of the church, but in reality these serve a much higher purpose. They exist so that the church can fulfill its mission of being the meeting-place between God and his people. The church is called to be the visible sign of God's presence in the world. As members of the Catholic Women's League of Canada, you are a part of that church. YOU are called to be that visible sign. Actively practicing your faith is not an option, especially if you are involved in the leadership of the League. You and your sisters in the League are called to help others understand that, as

church, we are all members of the family of God - rich or poor, strong or weak, male or female, young or old, and so on. We are called to care for one another. Our love for one another and our respect for one another is a fundamental element of our faith in Jesus. Everything we do can be a way to meet Jesus in each other and to touch his presence more deeply. However, to recognize him, we must first know him. That is why the spiritual must never be neglected nor downplayed in our League meetings and gatherings. Doing the work of Jesus is missing a major component if we do not first bring Jesus *into* the work through our prayer and reflection. We are children of God, which implies relationship, and not just workers of God, which implies achievers of tasks.

Our work should flow out of our love and heart knowledge (not merely head knowledge) of our Saviour. And as we know Jesus better, then we can lead others to know him better through our words and actions. According to the Fathers of Vatican II, "through the preaching [and living] of the gospel, the church makes the heavenly light of Christ visible to the whole world" (*On the Church*, 1). Women of the League, go make Christ's light visible to the whole world!

We have entered the season of Lent, a time to reflect on how much Jesus loves us even to the point of dying on a cross for our sins. It is a time to give thanks for our many blessings.

Even though we have not had any resolutions during my term as chairperson, I have been encouraged by the interest shown during discussions at the Catch the Fire workshops. It was also good to see, in reviewing the annual reports that many councils take the time to study past resolutions.

While at a dinner with friends, one of them (not a CWL member, not even a woman) remarked on the good work the Catholic Women's League does. It is a real

boost when people recognize what we do and one of the most important things we in the League do, is speak up to the government on issues that affect us all. We do this through our resolutions.

Last year a resolution was passed at provincial on reducing the stigma of mental illness. Today I watched W5 which discussed this issue. They talked with university students who had experienced depression to such a point that they had attempted/considered suicide and also spoke to military personnel suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder. Following this, the local news showed the new London Mental Health Centre that will open later this year and talked about the stigma of mental illness. Has your

council had a speaker on mental illness? If not, this might be a good time to have someone talk to your members on this topic as many families are touched by this.

I am coming to the end of my term as your Resolution Chairperson on diocesan council and I urge you to continue the good work. A resolutions/legislation workshop is available and I am sure the new chairperson would be happy to hold a workshop for your councils.

Thank you for your support over the past 2 years. May Our Lady of Good Counsel continue to bless you as you work for God and Canada.

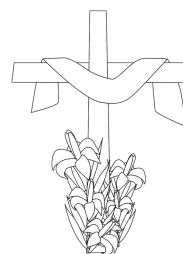

the PO Box number. Thanks for looking after this as the postage alone is very expensive. We really would like to get all materials out to every council.

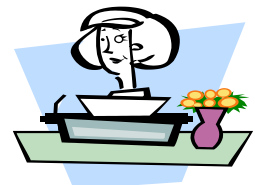

Treasurer—Madeleine Visser

Proverbs 24:3-4 *By wisdom a house is built, and by understanding it is established; and by knowledge the rooms are filled with all precious and pleasant riches.*

Wow! This statement is deep and holds such meaning for the job of the treasurer!

As my term of treasurer of the London Diocese draws to a close, I want to thank each of you for your input, your guidance, your friendship and your willingness to look at your positions under a different light. The Treasurer's position at your parish level is very important, you are the person with the knowledge and wisdom of how your council can proceed to do the many acts of kindness that you do...to be able to support your parish, and your community. I want you to know how much my position relies on your reports and your diligence in completing them on time. Without your reports I would have nothing to report to the hierarchy within the League and without your timely cheques to National with the dues, our Diocese is unable to conduct the business to continue to provide education {Conventions}, workshops, Retreats, a day at the Shrine etc, which in turn allows you to bring back to your councils your wisdom, knowledge and understanding of what is happening within your own backyard, and the world. Without your support to the timelines of reporting {year-end reports} and membership dues, which are due January 1st each year. The Diocesan Treasurer is unable to

fulfill the requirements of the position, such as sending the treasurer's reports in on time, creating a budget etc.

I am going to go over the Role of the Treasurer at the Parish level, which I hope will adhere to the timelines for whomever follows me in this position.

The Secret Recipe to doing year end Treasurer Report: Submitted by Treasurer, London Diocesan Council

I am positive there are many treasurer's out there who are confused by what goes where....I want to take this opportunity to simplify the report to you so that it reflects your true budget and payouts.

The year-end report is an example of the sections you need in your budget. Should your books be set up like the report, it is an easy thing just to copy the numbers from your tally sheet to the proper line in the report. If you are unable to wait until the end of December to do this, estimate what will be going out for the period to the end of the year and send the report to the Diocesan Treasurer the beginning of December.

As the treasurer, you have agreed to doing these reports so I am sorry there is no way around them. The report is broken into sections

that are aspects of our responsibility.

The first is our **PARISH**. Report what you spend to support the parish, broken into sections:

- Donations for church, parish, rectory, etc.: This is a "maintenance clause"...money you have donated towards material things...building fund, repairs to the roof, new equipment in the kitchen, etc.

- Gifts for clergy or staff: how much money has been spent on Birthday gifts, anniversary gifts, a new stole, lunch for the staff, and so on.

- Gifts for sacraments: do you spend money on baptismal scarves, or passports? What do you give to the newly married? Do you support RCIA, 1st Communion, 1st Confession, Confirmation? These expenditures are reported here.

Now, how do you support **MISSIONS**? What do you think **MISSIONS** is...Mission work is any work done to support others in their ministry to others. We have several categories

- Catholic Missions in Canada – straight forward – only donations to this organization goes on this line.

- 3rd World, Save-A Family, etc - much confusion in this area...3rd world missions would include

Haiti Relief, Buy-A-Net, MaterCare, Guatemalan Relief, Save-A-Family, Unicef, any support given to an organization that supports persons of the 3rd World (Central America, Africa, India, Malaysia, etc.)

- Other: Anything that does not fit above (missions in Canada – or the US for example)

Easy so far???

The next is one line only and is for **Development & Peace** – whether it is sent directly to that organization or collected through the 1% fund...this money is recorded as one sum here.

LEAGUE DEVELOPMENT comes next. This is monies you spend to better your council...

- Development, workshops, training – monies spent to bring someone in to do presentations that will enhance what the League does – it would include monies spent to attend Fall Regional Days, Day at the Shrine, Lenten Retreat or any other workshop presented
- Spiritual – perhaps you have a library and purchase books, tapes, CD's DVD's, or you purchase candles; you may do printing to send out prayers, or reflections.
- Convention – this is the money your council spends to send people to convention...don't forget to include the money send

for the collection! (you do send this, right...tithes 10% of your convention budget for collection at the closing mass)

As our mandate requests we support life from conception to natural death, the next category starts this chain, **PRO-LIFE**:

- National Pro-Life Fund: this is the monies that you send directly to National on their remittance form. National office controls this money and how it is distributed.
- Right to Life and Birthright are the only organizations under this heading. You may have sponsored baby showers, teas, fundraisers, or given money directly to either of these organizations.
- Homes for Unwed Mothers: although we don't see too many of these types of communities today, we still support unwed mothers. Many of your reports mentioned baby showers for these types of facilities.
- Other: an area to put money expended to support the Pro-Life movements not covered in the above categories. An example would be monetary support to a community centre that provides health programmes for pregnant women, or clothing for newborns or expectant mothers.

Following the same mandate, the next series supports life from after birth to natural death, the category is aptly named

C O M M U N I T Y ORGANIZATIONS

- Seniors and shut-ins...do you provide meals for those unable to fend for themselves, how about flowers, or cards sent to our own members, and members of your community. Do you assist at nursing homes or retirement homes? What about a Christmas lunch or celebration in your community geared towards seniors or shut-ins? Any monies spent in these regards would be recorded in this section.
- Community Organizations: this is a vast category and covers nearly any organization that you would support either by direct donation or gifts of kind...the organization list includes but is not limited to Red Cross Society, Cancer Society, Easter Seals, Rotary Club (Aquabox), Kidney Foundation, Alzheimer's Society, and so on.
- The Needy: support to such organizations as The St. Vincent de Paul Society or a food bank or shelters that support people of need. This is the support to the truly poor of our society. It differs from b) above because your support directly provides a service to people.
- Other: once again captures anything not covered above.

We're getting near the end now and want to find out how you support **CATHOLIC**

EDUCATION in your community

- Local Schools...do you support breakfast, lunch, or snack programmes in your community schools – does not need to be only the Catholic Schools, but local schools. How do you support catechism in the school? What about Rosary Clubs, Prayer Clubs, or anything else that you do to support our Catholic Education in our school system.
- National Funds: through the national remittance form you can support the Coady Institute or bursaries offered by the CWL National office
- Seminarian support...do you send money to our St. Peter's Seminary, or a local young man entering the seminary? Do you send money to augment our

bursaries available to the seminarians

- CWL Member Education: in reports we have had councils supporting our members to take courses that will enrich the parish life...we could also offer seminars and courses to our whole membership that enhances our work in our schools ... i.e., courses from various groups such as the Autism Society, etc.

And finally, the “OTHER” section, which captures anything not mentioned above. This category also has the directed donations of the current year

- WUCWO is directed by National CWL asking for our assistance to support this global organization to which we all belong
- Life Member and Past President Social Justice Award: London Diocese is collecting

monies for this community award in respect of the work done by our past presidents.

- Other: anything not mentioned above...but, I must caution you, unless you are directed at convention for a “specific” charity that we will be collecting for (example in 2009 we collected for Buy-A-Net, 2010 was Salt & Light TV) there should not be much in this column... everything fits in a category above.

Here we are, about to enter the great 40 days of Lent. I was thinking about our theme “We Have Seen the Lord—He is In Us” and what this Lent is calling me to be or do. I thought about the three C’s: Conversion, Conviction and Communion.

Conversion is a life-long process which is brought into sharper focus each Lent. Those who know me know that I have a special love of Max Lucado who writes, “He saw you cast into a river of life you didn’t request. He saw you betrayed by those you love. He saw you with a body that gets sick and a heart that grows weak. He saw you in your own garden of gnarled trees and sleeping friends. He saw you staring into the pit of your own failures and the mouth of your own grave. He saw you in your own garden of Gethsemane and he didn’t want you to be alone ... He would rather go to hell for you than to heaven without you.” All that we endure in our lives, Christ endured in his. Forgiveness is so essential to our growth in having the Lord come and live in us. And it’s not easy! But, “Forgiveness is unlocking the

door to set someone free and realizing you were the prisoner!”

Conviction in our Faith is our call each day and is strengthened by the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus. Many times I have people ask me about the meaning of the letters INRI on the scroll at the top of the crucifix. Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews. “Every passerby could read the sign, for every passerby could read Hebrew, Latin, or Greek—the three great languages of the ancient world. Hebrew was the language of Israel, the language of religion; Latin the language of the Romans, the language of law and government; and Greek the language of Greece, the language of culture. Christ was declared king in them all.” (Max Lucado)]

Communion is the unity which Conversion and Conviction bring to us. This unity calls us to be sisters who love and care for each other. “We are Jesus Christ’s; we belong to him. But even more, we are increasingly *him*. He moves in and commandeers our hands and feet, requisitions our minds and tongues. We sense his rearranging:

debris into the divine, pig’s ear into silk purse. He repurposes bad decisions and squalid choices. Little by little, a new image emerges.” (Max Lucado) That woman sitting next to you at your meeting or Pot-luck dinner or Retreat is the Lord. He is in her. We need to remember that!

Growing up I remember being told in school how privileged we were to grow up in a country where we are not persecuted for our beliefs. That idea seemed so foreign to me. I thought naively that only happened in the past. I also remember being warned that someday in the future we may not be able to practice our religion so freely as we did back then. I would have never been able to predict the world we are in now.

Marriage and family have taken a huge hit. They have both been redefined so much in an attempt to include everyone that they have lost their meaning and purpose. It used to be if you were from a one parent family you were an exception, and now it is almost the opposite way around. Society has opened a back door that is easy to open if marriages don’t work. Realistically how many couples getting married today enter into it with the trepidation of realizing this is till death do us part? Or do they just think well if worse comes I’ll just get a divorce? We as a society are leaving God out of our marriages.

Birth control has supposedly given women a lot more freedom, but has it? Again we are taking God

out of the equation and we are deciding when and how many children we will have and surprise, surprise now even in some places in the world the sex of the child. If a woman gets pregnant and the baby is not wanted or suspected of disabilities, it quite often ends in an abortion.

I remember when we first started protesting abortion we were warning that euthanasia of the older members of our society or severely disabled would be next. That day is here right now. We still have time to protest this issue, before the laws get changed.

In looking over the year end reports that you have sent me it is obvious that we are trying to minister to the youth, and I particularly like the ones where action is taken at the local schools. We sadly know that not all parents attend church, so therefore their children won’t either. Reaching them at the schools will leave an impression that they can take with them.

To minister to the disabled, we have to educate ourselves to what their difficulties are and see what we can do with them, and for them. Does some accommodations have to be made

We as a society are living longer and now there are more seniors. How are they being taken care of? Do we visit nursing homes and seniors living in their homes to see if their needs are being met? I am afraid there is a lot of isolation out there, where many seniors have no one to turn to.

I was really glad to hear Pope Francis talking about the divorced and separated Catholics in our midst. I feel great compassion for them because not only has their marriage failed but now they are in some case cut off from full communion with their faith.

Vocations. When we hear that word do we just think of vocations to the religious life or do we think of all vocations? God has a specific plan for all of us. The world does not tell you that. The world asks what you want to do with your life? It also pushes marriage as being the answer to life. We need to impress upon people to pray for an answer as to what God wants for us. Do you ever ask your family if they have prayed over it?

In closing I thank you for doing such good work in your communities. Together we can do great things together!

I hope and pray that we all had a restful and peaceful Christmas celebration with family and friends and we are invigorated again to continue our good deeds in so many ways to ensure the most vulnerable people in our communities and world are protected with love and justice.

First of all a sincere thank you to all Councils and members who generously responded to the relief efforts supported by Development and Peace in the aftermath of the dreadful Typhoon Haiyan that ravaged the Philippines last fall.

Here is an update from CCODP regarding the relief effort:- In the aftermath of the disaster, Development and Peace immediately began to collaborate with Caritas Philippines-NASSA, which is distributing food, water and other essential items in areas that were hardest hit by the storm. These include remote parts of the islands of Palawan and Panay, which have received less attention than other islands, yet still suffered enormous devastation. Development and Peace has just contributed an additional \$1 million to the efforts of Caritas Philippines-Nassa as it continues to bring aid to the most vulnerable affected by this disaster.

There are many areas of our world that are troubled with ethnic violence, religious intolerance or civil war:-

- As violence continues to escalate in the Central African Republic, the Catholic Church in the country is calling for an immediate ceasefire. "We're deeply concerned about the crisis in Central African Republic (CAR). The situation in Bangui is chaotic. Many people have been killed. The fighting must stop immediately," said Archbishop Dieudonné Nzapalainga of the capital Bangui. This call came after extremely violent clashes took place in the last few weeks that left hundreds dead. This most recent wave of fighting has led the United Nations to approve a small peacekeeping mission formed of African and French troops in hopes of restoring calm.
- Syrians have been fleeing battle zones in Syria and crossing over into neighbouring countries. The United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) reports that there are 1.3 million registered Syrian refugees, with over 400,000 in both Lebanon and Jordan, and over 300,000 in Turkey. The needs in camps are very high for food, clothing, medical assistance and other necessities. There are also large numbers of unregistered refugees living on their own or with friends or family. Since February, an estimated 8,000 Syrians are leaving their country each

day, which is placing an enormous strain on available resources in host countries. The federal government has made an initial commitment to resettle up to 1,300 Syrian refugees this year. Please try to encourage your parish council to help with this settlement

- The humanitarian crisis in South Sudan continues to have dire repercussions on local populations, who have had to adapt to living under the constant threat of conflict. They are now striving to form new communities, to regain their livelihoods, to feed their families, and to find peace and dignity in such difficult circumstances. Development and Peace is committed to standing by them through this ongoing crisis, which must not be forgotten.

Please act now to help refugees and people displaced from their countries - Let us pray for peace and reconciliation and also continue to financially support Development and Peace's relief efforts in the different parts of our troubled world.

Prostitution in Canada:-

Recently the Supreme Court of Canada struck down three Criminal Code provisions regulating prostitution in Canada; -living off the avails of prostitution; - communicating in public for purposes of prostitution; and - keeping or being found in a bawdy house.

The effect of the decision is suspended for 12 months to give Parliament a chance to respond. – to change the present laws governing prostitution.

The Catholic Civil Rights League (CCRL) calls for new legislation following this disappointing ruling. “Clearly this is not the decision we wanted, nor in our

opinion is it what the majority of Canadians would wish to see,” said CCRL League Executive Director Joanne McGarry. “We encourage the government to introduce new legislation on prostitution that will reduce its incidence and improve the safety and security of its victims.”

found on the CWL National website at www.cwl.ca. We should begin writing letters to the Canadian Government and our Members of Parliament asking them to introduce new legislation on Prostitution as soon as possible.

Seven Important things we can do to reduce Stigma and Discrimination associated with Mental Illness

1. **Know the facts.** Educate yourself about mental health problems. Learn the facts instead of the myths. Visit the mendthemind.ca and read the Top 11 Myths about Mental Illness.

2. **Be aware of your attitude and behaviour.** We've all grown up with prejudices and judgmental thinking, but we can change the way we think! See people as unique human beings, not as labels or stereotypes. See the person beyond their mental illness; they have many other personal attributes that do not disappear just because they have a mental illness.

3. **Choose your words carefully.** The way we speak can affect the way other people think and speak. Don't use hurtful or derogatory language.

4. **Educate others.** Find opportunities to pass on facts and positive attitudes about people with mental health problems. If your friends, family, co-workers or even the media present information that is not true, challenge their myths and stereotypes. Let them know how their negative words and incorrect descriptions affect people with

mental health problems by keeping alive the false ideas.

5. **Focus on the positive.** People with mental health and substance abuse problems make valuable contributions to society. Their health problems are just one part of who they are. We've all heard the negative stories. Let's recognize and applaud the positive ones.

6. **Support people.** Treat people who have mental health problems with dignity and respect. Think about how you'd like others to act toward you if you were in the same situation. If you have family members, friends or co-workers with substance use or mental health problems, support their choices and encourage their efforts to get well.

7. **Include everyone.** In Canada it is against the law for employers and people who provide services to discriminate against people with mental health and substance use problems. Denying people access to things such as jobs, housing and health care, which the rest of us take for granted, violates human rights.

People with mental and substance use problems have a right to take an equal part in society. Let's make sure that happens!

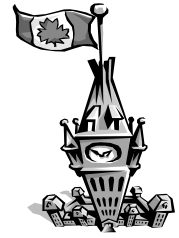

Legislation Standing Committee Chairperson—Dara Hartman



Recently, when I was researching a Bill on a legislative website, I came upon something that gave cause for excitement and is a genuine vehicle through which all of us can use our voices. It is called the 'Declaration of Hope' and a chance for us to revisit a Catholic Women's League initiative through the Euthanasia Prevention Coalition. It is a letter to all Canadian parliamentarians that urges our governments, federal and provincial, to reinvigorate their support of Canadians, rather than the death of Canadians. Incorporated with this letter is a 1 minute video-clip by Alex Schadenberg (a guest speaker at our 2010 convention in Sarnia) that outlines alternate treatments rather than euthanasia and/or assisted suicide and is very worth 1 minute of your time. The letter itself advocates against euthanasia and/or assisted suicide with 8 points/arguments:"

1. *to legalize euthanasia and/or assisted suicide would enable one citizen to directly and intentionally cause the death of another citizen or be involved with causing that death.*
2. *euthanasia and assisted suicide are not socially acceptable responses to terminal or incurable illness or chronic conditions.*
3. *euthanasia and assisted suicide pose a threat to the equality of persons.*
4. *older Canadians are not a problem to be rid of – they're a*

generation to be honoured and cared for.

5. *Canada must not place lives of citizens at risk.*

6. *legislation for euthanasia and/or assisted suicide is a recipe for abuse.*

7. *all Canadians should have access to quality pain control—no matter where they live.*

8. *being involved in one's health care plan and making informed choices are vitally important to a patient's sense of well being."*

I do not know one single CWL member who would be unwilling to put her signature on that declaration. Here is how to accomplish your support: go to the declarationofhope.ca website, review the information and please use your voice.

Shortly after I offered my support, I received by e-mail, a 'Euthanasia Prevention Coalition' Update Newsletter (which you can 'google' online). This outlines the activities and provides links to important legislative activity such as:

- the Quebec government commission that is examining Bill 52, the euthanasia bill, returned to its discussion of the euthanasia bill on January 15th. The Quebec National Assembly will return from its break on February 11th. Bill 52 will likely go to a vote in March.

- The Newsletter provides links

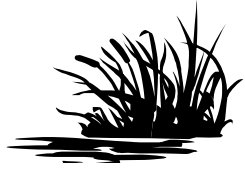
to [examine Bill 52](#) and to [sign a petition to help stop Quebec's euthanasia Bill 52.](#)

Another link in the Newsletter takes you to a petition that you may sign individually or hardcopy a petition for your council to sign and return to the EPC, involves the 'Carter vs. Canada case'. The Euthanasia Prevention Coalition has prepared its Supreme Court of Canada intervention in the Carter case, that seeks to legalize euthanasia and assisted suicide in Canada. A direct route to this petition is to go to epcc.ca/petition and click on **Petition / Euthanasia Prevention Coalition, Carter VS Canada**. This website offers a brief explanation of the case, the opportunity to sign the online petition and to print the petition in English. I cannot urge you strongly enough to sign these petitions and to allow yourselves and your councils the opportunity to use your voices, not once but three times, as we are called to do as Catholic Women's League members.

In January, 32 CWL ladies of Sarnia Lambton Region enjoyed a wonderful Potluck supper before our meeting. Father Jim Higgins,

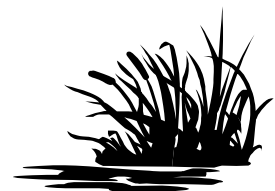
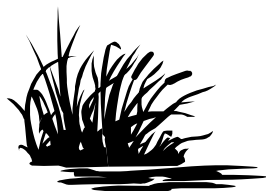
Pastor of St. Benedict's Parish, celebrated Mass for us prior to the Potluck.

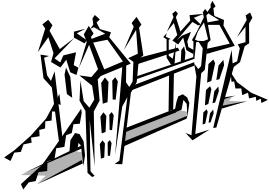

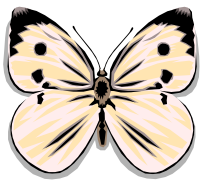

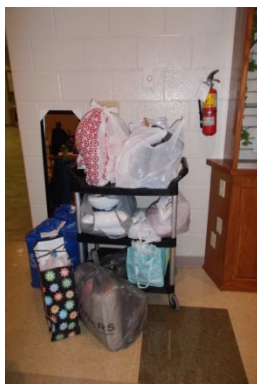

This year, our council did quite a bit of fund raising for our church roof. In the summer, we sold tickets on a garden leaf, which was

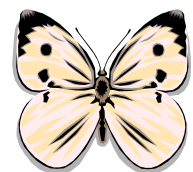
made by one of our members.
