

"While this fictional series does feature assisted dying, it does not sensationalize this controversial topic or encourage any one point of view. Mary Kills People is mindful to include various perspectives on the issue of assisted death, including those who do not agree with its practice."

I suggest that we complain to the advertisers of this terrible show and tell them that we will boycott them unless they drop this show. Our shopping dollars hold a lot of sway!

I would also like to remind you of the upcoming May 4th, 2017 12 Hours of Prayer for Hospice and Palliative Care, and to urge you to do your part to ensure the 2017 campaign receives even more attention and support than 2016.

Let's make our MP's/MPP's aware of the 12 Hours of Prayer for Hospice and Palliative Care, not only by letting them know of our concerns, but by inviting them to join with us on May 4th, offering their own prayer that all Canadians will have access to quality end-of-life care. Dear ____

There is a pressing need for all Canadians to have greater accessibility to palliative care. This end-of-life care is true compassion. It allows individuals who are facing death to not be burdened by pain and suffering but to receive the support that respects their human dignity both physically and spiritually.

The Canadian Hospice Palliative Care Association notes that "Support for hospice palliative care is almost unanimous, with the vast majority of Canadians (96%) being supportive, including 66% who are very supportive." However, they also note that, "Only 19% say it is available to those dying of life threatening illnesses" and that "one third of Canadians (34%) are not sure to whom hospice palliative care services are available".

Canadians both want and need compassionate, fully funded and readily available palliative care.

On May 4, 2017, The Catholic Women's League of Canada invites all people of faith to join in a nationwide **12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care.** This will coincide with National Hospice Palliative Care Week.

Because this is an issue that is extremely important to me, I will definitely be taking part in this initiative.

I am also adding my voice to the request "that hospice palliative care be specifically identified as a defined medical service covered under the Canada Health Act, so that provincial and territorial governments will be entitled to funds under the Canada Health Transfer system to be used to provide accessible and available hospice palliative care for all residents of Canada in their respective provinces and territories."

I invite you, as my elected government representative, to join me in prayer and solidarity on May 4th, and to use your influence to encourage the government to address this need in a prompt and positive manner.

I sincerely hope that I can count on your support, and look forward to hearing from you in this regard.

2nd Vice-President—Mary Bannon Resolutions Standing Committee Chairperson



Resolutions is most likely, I think, the committee that is the most rewarding since it brings about many changes in our society since so many CWL resolutions have become law. Examples are bicycle helmets for young people under 18, banning of tanning beds for those under 18, the white lines along the shoulders of our highways, religious postage stamps and so on. Resolutions is also, though, the committee which most parish councils find is the hardest.

First, we have trouble getting someone to chair the committee (I know because my own council has no Resolutions chair). I think we don't completely realize that the resolutions we work on bring about justice and righteousness. Righteousness is about building the kingdom of God. "In the Chinese language the word for righteousness is a combination of two characters, the figure of a *lamb and a person. The lamb is on top, covering the person. Whenever God looks down at you, this is what he sees: the perfect Lamb of God covering you."* (Max Lucado) I know as Catholic women we have a desire to build the kingdom of righteousness, the kingdom of peace.

A second problem with this committee is the fear of all the work involved in composing a Resolution. We tend to see this work as a big stone or boulder, impossible for us to move! But "The stone was moved-not for Jesus-but for the women; not so Jesus could come out, but so the women could see in!" ((Max Lucado, He Still Moves Stones). I think that as soon as those women saw inside they were inspired by the Spirit who dispelled their fear and compelled them to go and announce the good news of what they had seen

to the other disciples and became agents of change. When we pray and begin the work, one step at a time, we move this boulder with God's help and we can be agents of change bringing the good news. One by one we make a difference.

Another conundrum is the inability to see our unique giftedness as children of God. We say things like, "We have no one with the qualities and abilities needed to write a resolution". We are God's chosen vessels, not always shiny and polished, sometimes tarnished and cracked but we forget that *"God doesn't call the qualified. He qualifies the called."* (Max Lucado)






As I sit and write this article, I Being a Leponder on our new National theme, "Inspired by the Spirit, Women of Faith Respond to God's Call". There are many ways to respond to his call. for office

One of the biggest ways of responding to God's call is being an example to others in our homes, in our councils and in our parishes. We can use the power of prayer to respond to God's call. Sometimes we have to fight within ourselves whether or not we will choose to do God's will. We can be like the two brothers in scripture, one says yes but never fulfills the request and the one who says I'm too tired and refuses to go, later regretted his decision, and got himself up and went to do what he was asked. lesus' question right after is "Who do you think did the Fathers will?" We have to remind ourselves that every time we get up and go, even though we are tired, sore or wanting to do something else, but you choose to answer God's call, we are doing God's will, and are very likely an answer to someone's whispered prayer.

Over the next year my focus will be on explaining more fully the different types of prayer and to encourage you to utilize the different types. Being a Lector or Commentator, being an Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist are but a few ways to respond to God's call and be an example to others. Standing for office in your parish CWL council is another.

By our actions we are an example to others in our parish. An example of this is when we receive Holy Communion. In this and in no other sacrament, we receive the very body and blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ. In 1 Cor. 12 we are told that it deepens unity with the Church, more fully assimilating us into Christ. Approach the Eucharist in prayer, hands folded, then bow before the host and extend your hand with a cupped palm to receive Jesus. Immediately partake and return with your hands folded to your seat. If we all as CWL members do this, by our example, others will follow and this time will become more holy. Stay to the end of the Mass, as this is the time to thank Jesus for coming to you in the Holy Eucharist. This will encourage others to remain as well.

As we approach Lent, think of not only what we can "give up", but of what good works that we can do to celebrate Lent.

Reaching them at the schools will leave an impression that they can take with them. Many teens are on the streets and the opening of Teen Centers and Shelters are helping them to have a place to be safe, fed, and given guidance where needed.

Please remember the widowed and include them in our activities, offering them a ride to church or functions. Even though out winter has not been too bad, please remember to help them by shoveling out their driveways

To minister to the disabled, we have to educate ourselves to what their difficulties are and see what we can do for them. We could check in on them to see that they have proper accommodation, enough food to eat. Try offering them a ride to get out and take them to doctor's appointments, to the movies, shopping or just giving them your time.

In our society, we are living longer and there are more seniors. Do we visit the seniors in nursing homes to give them a little company? How about visiting them at home to see if they need help or just to be there and visit. Your time gives them so much comfort. I am afraid there is a lot of isolation out there, where many seniors have no one to turn to.

Vocations: When we think of that word, we think of vocations to the priesthood or religious life. God has a specific plan for all of us. It could be a vocation for marriage or single life. We need to discern on what God's calling for us. If you know of someone that is thinking of a calling, please pray for them. I want to wish everyone a happy Lent and a Happy Easter.

In September of 2016, The National Catholic Women's League posted the following Council Facebook Guidelines:

Councils are engaging through various social networking sites and Facebook is finding a prominent r o l e i n t h a t l i s t. Recommendations for use of and subsequent monitoring of a Facebook page for parish council should include/observe/practice the following;

- 1. Request written permission if the council intends to use the League logo.
- Assign one or two administrators to moderate the account and post messages.

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- 3. Be respectful of the League and its members.
- 4. Know your members and tailor content to their needs.
- 5. Engage your members. Ask for feedback, ask questions, communicate with them, etc.
- 6. Reply to questions as quickly as possible.
- 7. Use a recognizable profile picture.
- 8. Promote the League through your own contacts. Follow others first, comment, like etc.

- 9. Keep posts brief, timely and concise.
- Compose posts carefully and thoughtfully. You do not want to offend or harm the reputation of the League.
- 11. Proofread and be sure material referenced is accurate before publishing.
- 12. Vary your posts (text, links, photos, videos, etc.) and vary your content.
- 13. Post at strategic times during the day based on your audience. Facebook posts should be limited to once or twice per day to encourage engagement.
- 14. Share posts and information relevant to your members from the national Facebook page.
- 15. Tag other people and businesses when mentioned in photos, text posts etc. but be considerate of those you are tagging. Be courteous and ask permission first.
- 16. Be aware that individual members do not speak on behalf of the League.
- 17. Be sure to indicate when views are personal, and not the League's.
- Periodically update the "About" page.

- 19. Don't post private matters on a public wall. Use private messaging.
- 20. Don't over share/over post.
- 21. Don't abuse hash tags.
- 22. Don't oversell/over market.
- 23. Don't let your page become dormant.
- 24. Don't use Cap Lock.
- 25. Don't repeat the same post.

We finished our year with a delicious Pot Luck dinner. The men were invited to this event and the Men's Choir entertained us. There was a good turn out to finish the year 2016.



<u>SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE</u>

2 tbsp. corn starch 2/3 cup white sugar 4 tsp. orange rind 6 tbsp. melted butter 2/3 cup brown sugar 1/2 tsp. salt 2 cups orange juice

Slice and cook sweet potatoes in a 9 x 13" dish. Cook the above listed ingredients like a pudding sauce. Cover the sliced and cooked sweet potatoes, add some slivered almonds if you wish. Bake at 325° oven for 3/4 of an hour.

The nutritional value of sweet potatoes is unsurpassed. Sweet potatoes can be baked in a microwave, boiled on the stove or baked in the oven. Sweet potatoes should never be washed, just dried off with a paper towel or cloth, then of course peeled after cooling and before slicing.

In 1995, community groups and members banded together to bring a dialysis unit to Alexandra Marine and General Hospital (AMGH) in Goderich. Approximately \$200,000 was raised during the Dialysis '95 campaign. The dialysis unit opened in 1999 and operated three days a week, serving a dozen patients. Despite the success of this initial fundraiser, with the restrictions of the existing equipment, several patients from our area, with specific needs, were required to travel to London (a two hour round-trip in ideal conditions) regularly to receive dialysis treatments.

At a community meeting held in 2015 to investigate what could be done to eliminate the need to travel to London for these patients, the show of support was overwhelming. Those in attendance included patients,

advocates, health care workers and representatives from several local service clubs who played an integral part in the success of the Dialysis '95 campaign.

The largest challenge involved the lack of funding to update the existing equipment. So, in order to combat this challenge, AMGH was asked to provide a list of capital equipment and the cost associated with its purchase. With the financial needs identified, the goal was set and the community sprung into action.

With fundraising underway, St. Peter's Catholic Women's League committed to raise \$5,000.00 for this worthwhile project. Our League hosted a number of breakfasts following Sunday Masses, with funds being dedicated to this project. In addition, homemade pies (or pieces of pie) were sold at the breakfasts. With the generosity and support of our League sisters and parishioners we were able to meet our \$5,000.00 pledge much earlier than anticipated.

In May 2016 the community, working together, surpassed the overall \$125,000 goal by \$25,000.00, allowing AMGH to purchase all the items on their capital equipment list. This new equipment now provides the Hospital with the flexibility to serve additional patients, as needed.

The upgrades and refurbishment are planned to be completed very soon. At that time, there will be an official unveiling of the donor plaque at the AMGH. What a testament to the power of a dedicated community working together.
